Some thoughts from St Mary's Manse



The clocks go forward as British Summer Time begins on 30th March, which also happens to be the fourth Sunday in Lent and Mothering Sunday. We certainly hope for some fine spring weather as the visitors come to our islands, and

those of us who live here recover from what at times have been pretty testing periods of weather. Soon our summer season slide shows will begin and I know that June Lethbridge has some very dramatic shots of waves crashing into the Mermaid pub in February, and I am looking forward to showing visitors to my slide show some dramatic pictures of waves flooding over the road at Old Town just a few days later.

It seems to me that when the weather is good on Scilly it is very good and when the weather is bad it is very bad! But despite the weather, life goes on. Transport has certainly been difficult, but we give thanks to all those who have their utmost to fly our planes when possible, and we are especially thankful to the crew of our cargo boat the Gry Maritha who have braved raging seas to make sure that even in this difficult winter we have had food to eat and all the other things that are needed in this island community.

Throughout the winter we have been able to worship each Sunday on both St Mary's and St Martin's. Some of the crossings to St Martin's have certainly been exciting and on the few occasions that I have not been able to get across, our local preacher on St Martin's, Chris Savill, has been there to step in and lead worship.

Hopefully the weather in April will be fine and we certainly look forward to welcoming visitors to our islands and to our chapels on St Martin's and St Mary's. Easter Sunday this year is on 20th April and our worship on St Martin's will be at 3pm. On St Mary's we will be celebrating Easter Sunday in the morning at sunrise on Buzza Hill followed by our morning worship at 10.30am. In the evening at 8pm we will have a special Easter Songs of Praise. On St Mary's we will also be meeting for a short service of readings and passion hymns on Good Friday at 10am.

At the end of the month we will welcome our District

Chairman, Steve Wild to our islands. He will be with us from the 25th to the 28th and will be leading worship on St Mary's on the Sunday, leading our fellowship on St Mary's on the Friday evening and free to visit members on St Martin's and St Mary's on the Saturday. If you would like to speak with Steve during his visit please let me know so we can arrange a time.

During the summer months, especially when the weather is good, the scenes on Scilly remind us of the setting into which the Gospel story is told. Our sandy beaches remind us of the shores of Lake Galilee where Jesus spoke to the gathered crowds, we see fishermen landing their catch, and it is easy to imagine the many stories that we read in the New Testament being in a place just like these islands.

In the very last chapter of John's Gospel we have the moving story of Jesus on a beach in the first light of day as the fishermen returned from a night of fishing during which very few fish had been caught. We are told that the fishermen were so caught up in their disappointment that they failed to recognize Jesus. As the story unfolds we are reminded of how we may meet with Jesus in the ordinary things of life and the message of the Gospel becomes clear – Jesus certainly has the power for us all to make a fresh start in our lives. Yes, in every way this is truly an Easter story.

The story starts with an atmosphere of disappointment. We find that the disciples, despite having seen the risen Jesus twice before, had now, for a while put the past behind them and had returned to their work as fishermen on Lake Galilee. We are told that throughout the night they had cast their nets but no fish had been caught. Then, as daylight began to dawn on the sad and tired fishermen, Jesus came and stood on the shore and saw their disappointment.

The fishermen heard His voice and they heard Him call them 'Friends', they did as they were instructed and cast their nets again, and it is at this point that the whole atmosphere of the story changes. A large number of fish were caught, their sadness turned to joy, despair turned into hope, and it was at this point that the disciple John cried out at the top of his voice 'It is the Lord!'

This Easter story set by the sea on a sandy beach ends up with Jesus asking Peter the question 'Do you love me?' This question was asked not once but three times by Jesus and each time Peter answered 'Yes'. And as we read this moving story it is as if Jesus appeared to His disciples especially to speak with Peter. Peter now had the chance to put behind him his past mistakes. He was now able to draw a line under the past and under that occasion when, just a week before, he had denied being a follower of Jesus, and now he, just like us, was able to be sure of God's forgiveness and to start afresh in a life of service to the Lord who had been raised from the dead. What Jesus said to Peter is of great importance to us all, for Jesus did not say to Peter that from then on his life would be 'plain sailing'. Instead He simply said 'Feed my sheep' and be prepared for a life that at times might be far from comfortable. The message is clear: when we make a commitment in our lives to follow Jesus and the ways of His kingdom, we are also called to a life of service and we are also called to live by His ways in every aspect of our lives. The risen Jesus promised His followers that He would always be with them on their journey, and today in the light of the Easter story we know this to be true. In the power of His Holy Spirit He is with each one of us, He calls us to tell others of His love and forgiveness, He calls us to make a fresh start in our lives. Yes, He promises to be there with us in all that we may face as His followers in this world today. Those fishermen who were so disappointed that morning after having fished all night without a catch did not expect to see Jesus standing on the beach to greet them, but there He was, with them in the ups and downs of May we who live on these beautiful islands know the presence of our Lord. May we celebrate the Easter story in the way we live and relate to one another and may the mighty power of His Holy Spirit enable us to truly follow His great commandment and love as God loves us. On the 5th of this month Len Michell and I will be representing our circuit at the Cornwall Methodist Synod in Truro: please remember to pray for all who met on that day to further the work and mission of our precious Methodist Church in Cornwall and on these islands.

Where ever you may live, may you know the blessings of our risen Lord Jesus. I remain, by the grace of our loving God, the Methodist minister on these islands for a while. Charlie Gibbs

Letter from Rev. Peter Bolt

We were glad to receive the copy of the February/March "In Touch" and to catch up on the news of the Churches on Scilly, and we look forward to being with you for a little while later in the year.

The article on page 13 about 'John Wesley's Elm' brought back memories of our ministry before we started coming to the islands in 1967. When I left theological college in 1953, my first appointment was to Wolverton, a railway town in what is now Milton Keynes. One of my Churches was at Stony Stratford and we well remember the elm tree with a small plaque which said that John Wesley used to preach there and I believe we held a short service there to commemorate the occasion.

Then, on the adjoining page of "In Touch" there was Anne's account of her visit to Wesley's Chapel in London. In the 1960's the Church was closed and there was discussion about the viability of restoring it. As the British Secretary to the World Methodist Council, I was involved in this and a group of us, led by Dr Kenneth Greet formed a committee to look into the cost of not only the restoration, but also the renovation of the garden at the rear where John Wesley is buried. I was made the secretary and we decided to ask our architect to make a model of the whole site which we could take to the next meeting of the Executive Committee of the WMC which was to be held in Mexico City. I was given the job of taking the model, which was some four feet long, to Mexico, which I did with some difficulty. The story of how I was detained by customs for a couple of hours until I was rescued by Bishop Ruiz of Mexico is only part of the problems I faced, but eventually I got - rather late - to the meetings and the American United Methodist Church delegates offered to raise

On March 14th Chris Hensleigh and Jackie coordinated a shared lunch with the "team" and some members in the new Community Hall. After that time of fellowship other members and some of our Anglican friends joined us for worship, shared testimonies, discussion and a final drawing together in prayer and reflection. Individually and collectively, we were truly blessed by this opportunity to think deeply about where we are in our relationship with God, and to be reminded that God sets no targets, he just wants us to love Keith and Robin returned to St. Martins on March 16th to lead worship in our Chapel. Once more we were able to learn of the varying ways God calls people into a closer relationship with him, through hearing their two different experiences. Keith spoke of the early influence in his life of his Boys Brigade Captain (Alan), of how he had lost touch with him, of how God must have been at work in the way they were reunited towards the end of his life and of how Alan's deep belief sustained him in the days prior to his death. A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE NET:SCILLY YOUTH INITIATIVE FOR THE METHODIST CHURCH SYNOD IN CORNWALL...

NET:SCILLY...

Since July 2012, I've been visiting the Isles of Scilly once a month to support and inspire young people in their walk with God, and to give those with questions an opportunity to explore faith, God and life from a Christian perspective - an initiative we have called NET:SCILLY.

It began as a voluntary initiative after an inspired appointment with Andrew Nicholson (District Youth Work Enabler) and a recognition of the needs of young people on the islands. There had been no Christian youth group on the islands for over three years. After four months of voluntary visits, a District grant enabled me to develop the project further to work for four days each month from November 2012. NET:SCILLY secured a further grant from the District in October 2013 to continue this work for another twelve months, and is also now partly funded by the Isles of Scilly Methodist Circuit and the Anglican Church on Scilly.

A little bit of background about me (Jen Scott was nightingale)...

I was born and grew up on the islands, went to school on Scilly, leaving aged 16 to go to the mainland for college and university. After a time traveling I moved back for a further 8 years to start my own business as a Freelance Illustrator and Graphic Designer. During those 8 years, amongst other things, I was involved in running a youth group through the Methodist Church, volunteering at the local council run youth club and hosting an alpha course. I moved to Cornwall in 2009 where I currently live with my husband Dave. I became a Christian aged 13 through a drama mission group who visited the youth club I attended on St Mary's, run by the Methodist Church. I was not from a church background and Christianity was all new to me. Having experienced the joys and challenges of being a young Christian on the islands, I have a real heart for the young people of Scilly and desire to inspire them that life with God is a fantastic adventure that's totally relevant to them.

what's been happening?...

★ Last year we ran youth alpha with a small group of 11-16 year olds (who are absolutely brilliant!) and this year that same group (minus one who has moved to the mainland for college) are growing in relationship with God and each other, and we're using the CY materials from Christianity Explored for our monthly sessions.

These gatherings are designed to encourage the youth in their own walk with God, and to equip them for living out their faith in their school, home, family and community.

The youth alpha/CY group includes a weekend away in Cornwall each year which gives opportunity to meet other Christian teenagers and to build stronger relationships with each other and with God.

- ★ It's been great to work with the school on the islands and I've had the privilege of participating in a series of RE lessons and taking a number of assemblies. We are currently meeting in a room in the school for our CY group. We hoped to run youth alpha again this year, alongside CY, for new young people, but as yet this has been unsuccessful.
- * For the last few months I've been visiting the local hostel on my visits, to build relationships and enjoy games with the young people from the off-islands.

 They're all so great and fun to be around!
- * As part of NET:SCILLY, I also mentor a girl who's just turned 18, who is currently studying in Truro College after moving away from the islands. We've been a part of the 'Rise-Up' mentoring program, meeting fortnightly/3 weekly for lunch, study, chat and prayer. She also is really lovely and it's a real pleasure to be a part of her journey.
- ★ Lastly, through a growing hunger amongst some adults on the islands, God led us to begin Alpha for adults in February. The first session saw 8 guests, with a further 4 keen to join us in March. Guests are from a mixture of backgrounds, some connected with church and some not, which is great. I'm continually encouraged by evidence of God at work in the community on the Isles of Scilly, it's so exciting.

The future...

NET:SCILLY began as a way of re-establishing Christian-based youth work on the islands. Though my background makes me well-placed to identify with the young people of Scilly, ideally Christian's living locally would be a much better longer-term solution for the young people. I have had the privilege of working with an amazing lady called Lynne Miller, who has been God's provision since 2012 of someone to partner with. She's been absolutely vital to the success of NET:SCILLY. She is fun-loving, wise, has years of experience of walking with God and is able to relate so well to the young people. It's also been great to have occasional help from a couple of others who've stepped in for special events. At this time, there is no-one that I am aware of locally with capacity/desire to take on this role for the next season. I'm praying that God would raise up people on the islands to carry the vision and I'm hopeful that in His time, this will happen. For now, this calling is on me and it's a privilege to be able to invest in so many lives in this way.

\$1,000,000 towards the costs. So the scheme went ahead. The model is still in the WMC museum at Lake Junaluska in North Carolina. Many British Methodists were against the scheme, but we got it through Conference and the Queen and Prince Phillip attended the re-opening service a few years later. Incidentally, at a special service at the Mint Methodist Church which I was attending as an ex-minister, when the Rev Lord Leslie Griffiths was the guest preacher, he went out of his way in public to say how he was one of the ones who opposed the restoration and that he was wrong and we were right to maintain our Methodist witness in the city of London! 
