#### Lent Lunches.

The Lent lunches were as well supported as ever this year, despite snow and some very stormy days. We all enjoyed some lovely soups and a warm welcome as well as making money for Christian Aid. A grand total of £1,170 was made with a further £200 from Gift Aid.

#### Women's World Day of Prayer.

As was the case all over the country, the WWDP act of worship had to be postponed because of the icy conditions on March 2<sup>nd</sup>. However the service was still well supported a week later, with thirty one attending the Anglican Church, including Perran on the piano. Thank you Perran, for your time, skill and enthusiasm.

The service this year was prepared by the women of Surinam. It was titled "All God's Creation is Very Good", and the readings were from Genesis and Psalm 8. Unsurprisingly, there was an environmental theme when the congregation focused on the wonder of Creation and human's neglect of it. Individually, members of the congregation were asked to commit to one thing they would do in the future to help preserve God's Creation.

I would like to thank those who attended the planning meeting for willingly taking parts, (including Jane Chiverton who could not be with us on the second date but helped provide costumes), the ladies of the Anglican Church who set the scene and provided the welcome tea and biscuits afterwards, and those who came along to worship with us .Eileen deserves a particular expression of thanks for leading us through the moving service, and so ably getting her tongue around the Sranan phrases!

An eclectic range of charities are supported by the WWDP organisation. It is good to report an offertory of £190 which will help boost the allocation of grants next year. For those of you reading this who do not attend the ecumenical world-wide WWDP worship, perhaps I could encourage you join us next year. The organisation is now in consultation with local groups

about dropping "Women's" from their title, as originally it was just World Day of Prayer. A letter of explanation has stated that the movement would still be entirely women led, and would continue to give women in some countries a rare opportunity to speak out about what matters to them. But there is a perception with the present title that men are not welcome, although they always have been, and to younger people it might sound old fashioned. Here in the Islands the group who regularly participate in the annual service have voted to support the recommendation. Eleven ladies were in favour of dropping "Women's" from the title and six voted against.

#### Beneath The Cross of Jesus

I have been asked to write something about a favourite hymn, and, as Passiontide is fast approaching as I write, I have decided to write about my favourite Passion hymn.

There are a number of very powerful passion hymns in our Hymnbooks, but, in my view, '*Beneath the Cross of Jesus'* is the most powerful.

Found at No 197 in the 1933MHB, and 165 in H&P, it was written by Elizabeth Cecilia Clephane, a very descriptive hymn written, and is usually sung to a lovely tune composed by Ira David Sankey.

I set particularly great store by MHB verse 2, which was dropped in Hymns and Psalms. ( A very great mistake in my opinion). This verse reads:

Upon that Cross of Jesus Mine eye at times can see The very dying form of One Who suffered there for me. And from my stricken heart, with tears, Two wonders I confess-The wonders of redeeming love, And my own worthlessness.

It is such a descriptive verse that, when I get the chance to sing it, I find I can picture the scene of My Lord on the Cross.

I went to Chapel in Plymouth some years ago, when the Rev Peter Bolt was minister, and he had included this hymn in the service. He was so incensed that this powerful verse had been dropped from H& P that he had it printed out, and it was inserted as the  $3^{rd}$  verse, meaning that we sung four verses in all.

I conclude with the final verse which I hope we will all take to heart.

I take, O Cross, thy shadow: For my abiding -place! I ask no other sunshine than The sunshine of His face; Content to let the world go by, To know no gain nor loss-My sinful self my only shame, My glory all- the Cross

#### The Smiths Across the Water

We are living at the top of Penzance, just off St. Clare Street near the Leisure Centre and College. A little research led me to discover that St. Clare (one of the first followers of St. Francis of Assisi) is the patron saint of Laundry Workers – rather apt for five of us sharing a house!

We are settling in comfortably to mainland life. Emily is into her second year of college and enjoying living a five minute walk from her lecture rooms. Becky has a little further to go, 20 minutes to Mounts Bay Academy and both Vicky and I have a 16 minute drive to our respective works, Cape Cornwall School and Land's End Airport. Josh has settled in to working at the Co-op at the top of Chapel Street and already has had to deal with shoplifters and squirrels, though not at the same time!

There is much about the islands we miss, but I think for all of us the biggest part is the people, the community, our friends, though I don't think I have been into town once and not met someone I know, either from the islands, from my college days or my time at Chapel Street Methodist Church.

We have settled at "Hope Church" in Alverton, courtesy of Vicki. She did some mystery shopping and visited a handful of churches in the area before I moved, and, with no criticism of the others, there was just something about Hope that made her feel comfortable and warm inside. It just felt right. After having been for a few weeks we worked out that there were five or six of the congregation that we knew from our time at Chapel Street and Ian Curnow, who served as the PC to the islands in the mid 90's (now running a charity on the Treneere Estate).

We are settling into the rhythm of mainland life with the opportunities it affords us in terms of places to explore and the chance to catch up with so many friends and family. I have taken full advantage of our proximity to the cinema and swimming pool and I'm gradually making my way back to Scilly, one swimming session at a time, keeping a record of my distances, I'm over half way there!!! and thankfully this is helping my health and continuing recovery immensely.

I have also got involved in the Street Food Project, a brilliant community effort to help the homeless and

disadvantaged in West Cornwall. It started a little over a year ago once a week, serving hot food and drinks to anyone who needed them and from there it has grown to a huge band of volunteers, all seven nights a week in a slick operation to help, feed and care for those that need it. Anyone is welcome as a guest, whatever their circumstances. Servers pitch up at the station at 6 p.m. with a couple of tables, chilli, moussaka, stew, vegetables, rice, apple crumble, custard, chocolate bars, tea, coffee and hot chocolate..... it varies from night to night. Between 20 and 30 guests are served, chatted to, listened to and, where possible, helped with things like warm clothes, sleeping bags and other items. Within 60 minutes, the area is tidy and our guests are making their way home, wherever that might be. Twenty to thirty.......

Twenty to thirty people of different ages, gender, nationalities and backgrounds, every night. Twenty to thirty people in need of help, a warm meal, someone to talk to....... They break the stereotype of the beggars and the homeless. They care for each other and share what they have. They have more manners than some in school uniforms I see (and hear) walking down Causewayhead and they have respect for everyone around them. And every story is different. I am hoping that over time I will be able to forge a link between the work we do in Penzance and the community of the islands, but for now I am just finding my feet and learning the ropes.

I look forward to writing to you all again in a few months and updating you with our news from the mainland community.

The Christian has a wonderful heritage - and best of all - "We look for a NEW heaven and a NEW earth in which righteousness abides." *2 Peter 3.13.* 


A NEW creation sings a NEW song, which God, by His grace, has put into our mouth. *Psalm 40.3.*
