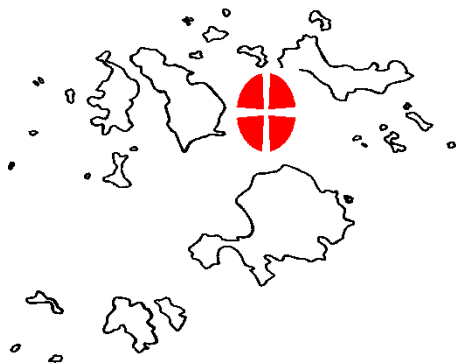

Some thoughts from the St. Mary's Manse

I write this letter before I go the Mainland for my sabbatical to continue my ongoing work on St John's Gospel and to attend various meetings and courses, where I hope to meet up with some old friends and colleagues. This means that during my time away that various visiting ministers will be here making sure that there is someone to offer help in times of need.

During the second week of August our old friend Rev Professor Peter Stephens will be with us and will be leading worship on St Martin's and St Mary's, and the following weekend our services will be led by Rev Derek Lee who is a minister in the Church in Wales and a regular visitor to our islands. We look forward to welcoming them to the islands and worshipping with them while they are with us. Peter Stephens will also be providing cover for us at the start of October, for two Sundays.

From the middle of August until the middle of September Rev Jane Wilcock will be with us and residing on St Mary's, we look forward to Jane's visit especially as she has been to the islands many times before and led us in worship on St Martin's on some of these visits. Jane has certainly shown a great generosity to us as she will be returning to be with us again at the end of October. We are looking forward to getting to know her well.

Lastly, but by no means least, we are delighted that Rev Margaret Barnes will be on our islands and leading worship on St Mary's over the last weekend in September. It is good for us to have visiting friends to lead us in worship, and it is always a delight to be challenged and enriched by those who serve in our mainland churches.

The last service that I will lead before my study leave will be the planned Songs Of Praise on Sunday 2nd August on the quay on St Mary's. These outdoor songs of praise evenings during the summer months on St Mary's have proved to be popular with visitors and locals and we give thanks to the harbourmaster for being so helpful in allowing us to worship together on the quay.

Also in August we have our annual 'Children's Holiday Club' on St Mary's which this year is from the 17th to 22nd of the month. This is always an important event in our church calendar, and we give thanks to all who work so hard to make this possible. We rejoice that so many children on St Mary's enjoy coming along to our Saturday Seekers Children's Club and to this annual summer holiday club.

It is certainly good news that so many are working so well together to further the work and the mission of our church on these islands, for this is the way that the Good News of The Gospel is shared and how we together can proclaim the grace of our loving God in this island community.

Grace is a crucial gift in the life of our church, and this word 'Grace' is found on almost one hundred occasions in the writing of Paul when writing his letters of encouragement to the early church. To Paul grace is the very bedrock of our precious Christian Faith, and it's Paul who writes "By the grace of God I am what I am, and His grace to me was not without effect!"

Paul speaks of how grace brings freedom to our lives, he speaks of lives freed from legalism and ritual, and he speaks of how this way of living helps us to reflect the generosity and character of our loving and forgiving God. Indeed to Paul, us living grace-filled lives is the very proof of God's power in this world to those around us.

Yes how we relate to others on our journey certainly is crucial in our mission as a church. How graceful are we in the face of adversity? How do we react when we are let down by others? And is God's grace seen in our lives being built upon the solid rock of faith in the crucified and risen Christ?

Whenever we seek the 'easy way' and fail to take up our cross and follow we are denying the grace of God; When we look the other way in the face of suffering or lack the courage to befriend the friendless we are denying the grace of God; when we evade our responsibilities and deny God's provision we are denying His grace, and whenever we are quick to condemn and slow to forgive we are denying the power of the Cross and we are living lives that lack the power of God's grace to us in Jesus. Maybe the only hope for this world, this island community, and for our church is to be found in us again rediscovering The Grace of God!

As we again think of God's provision in our lives I am reminded that our annual St Mary's Church gift day this year will again be on the Saturday of harvest weekend on the 19th of September. Please do come along to the manse that day and give your gifts to our stewards, but if you are unable to do this please send a cheque made payable to 'St Mary's Methodist Church' and send it by post to 'The Manse, Church Street, St Mary's, Isles Of Scilly, TR21 0JT. On my return to the islands I will write a letter of thanks to all who have communicated in this way. We give thanks to God for all that is past and we continue to trust Him for all that is to come. Together we certainly are determined that the joy of our precious Christian faith will continue to be shared on Scilly.

Finally we give thanks that our District Chair and evangelist Steve Wild is serving for a year as the president of the Methodist Conference. During his time in this office we are delighted that Rev Carole Holmes is standing in for Steve as our District Chair. Carole will be visiting our islands over the summer and autumn to chair various meetings, but should you need to speak with her she can be contacted at the home in Redruth on 01209 216638.

May the grace of God made known to us in Jesus continue to be seen in the fruit of His Holy Spirit, and may the power of this continue to be seen in our love of one another.

I remain by the grace of God the Methodist Minister on these remote yet beautiful islands for a while.

News from St. Martins

On Sunday 14th June we celebrated nearly 50 years of boating service by Terry Perkins. Tea was laid on at the Tennis Court Pavilion after Terry was taken on board the Voyager on a mini cruise around the islands with family and past crew members. Christine Savill spoke on behalf of islanders of his long service - including the transportation of our ministers! Terry was then presented with a commissioned Sue Lewington painting, which was a montage of all his boats, as a thank you and to mark his retirement. We wish him many more years of boating in his new pleasure craft.

The annual circuit service was held in the St. Mary's Chapel due to poor weather, which, along with injury, prevented some of our members from attending. Fortunately Derek Perkins attended, as Len's address referred to working in a Vineyard!

On Sunday July 5th we gave a warm welcome to Rev David Easton who returned to the islands after 6 years. We all enjoyed a sumptuous tea in the Sunday School Room followed by our evening service. It was good to catch up with David again and hear about all his recent work, which included time in Aberystwyth preaching in Welsh and ministering to the undergraduates. He is now "first minister" of all the Methodists in Scotland, and it was also good to hear news of Jeremy Dare and family and the Shetland Isles

David took as his theme "Prayer" and we were reminded of the need to find quiet times to reflect and connect. It is important not always to pray selfishly, especially in a time when the refugee problem escalates and people flee

oppression and war. We also need to be able to forgive; if we are unable to do this we may compromise our own lives with bitterness. Serious messages, but as always there was also much laughter. "They do say ...laughter is the best medicine"! We hope David will return before another six years pass.

On Sunday 12th July we celebrated 'Sea Sunday' when our worship was led by Chris Savill. He reminded us of the amazing work carried out by The Mission to Seafarers which is on call everyday in over 260 ports to support some 1.5 million seamen, many of whom are thousands of miles from home. So many of us have family and friends who make their living on the sea and, being surrounded by it, it seems appropriate to acknowledge the work of this voluntary organisation. The well-being of seafarers is at the heart of the work of The Mission which includes emergency response, care and hospitality and of course, spiritual support.

We sang some familiar hymns with a nautical note, and Chris took his theme from Luke's writing in Acts - of St Paul's shipwreck on the island of Malta, of Paul's leadership and subsequent respect gained by the captain and captor, which enabled him to save all hands on board. We hope all ships have a safe passage through our islands, as we hope all people can have a safe passage through life.

Troy Town Maze

Over the course of our warm summer, many of us, both residents of the islands and holiday makers will visit St Agnes.



Apart from a trip to Troy Town Farm for ice cream, I am sure many will visit Troy Town Maze. It had fallen into disrepair so people thought it was a maze but after its repair it was discovered to be a labyrinth.

So what is the difference? Mazes tend to have high walls and choices as to where one should go. A labyrinth on the other hand, has only one route in and out. The only choice is whether to enter.

Labrynth, in the past, were used as an alternative to pilgrimage for those who were unable to cope with the journey. Many were set up in cathedrals. The idea was that the journey into the centre was longer than you might expect allowing time to leave everyday pressures behind in the centre and to return out of the labyrinth refreshed.

The concept of pilgrimage is ancient. Each pilgrimage comes with a challenge: it may be the sheer physicality of the journey, or it may be the inward journey as we plumb the depths of our true selves. We may notice physical changes – wearing out boots and shoe leather on the roads that take us to the holy places, feeling the ache of limbs and the burden of our luggage, enduring the rigours of the weather with the burning sun and the biting wind and rain.

But we may also notice important changes within: perhaps a sense of peace and unity with the world and people, perhaps a more tolerant understanding of our own weaknesses and foibles, perhaps a desire to live life more fully and more faithfully. Basil Hume assures us that for all the rough paths we have to take, whether alone or with others, whether in speech or in silence, the crucial thing is to keep looking for the right way. 'There is one who is on the look-out to guide us: it is the Son of God, who is the way, the truth and the life.'

The use of labyrinths has been revived today as by Christians as a form of reflection on the path of life. At the Methodist Conference at Southport, a beach labyrinth was set up and people were invited to use this as a means of reflection. People were invited to take rubbish into the centre, leave it at the cross in the centre of the labyrinth and then walk out ready to start afresh.



So, if you do happen to go to St Agnes, why not take a little time to go on your own mini pilgrimage at Troy Town labyrinth?

"Be still and know that I am God" Psalm 46:10

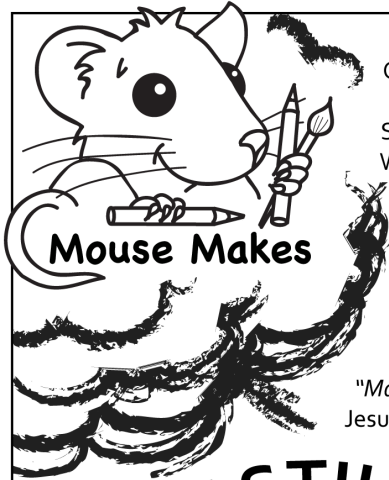

5th August 1945
