# A Christmas prayer from the Methodist Worship Book:

God of light and hope, of stars and surprises: open our eyes to your glory and our hearts to your presence, that we may respond with joy to the angel song ...

#### Some thoughts for the season ...

Given my name, it seems apt to begin this piece with a reference to Christmas songs. Perhaps as you read this, you've already heard, or even sung some ...

Christmas music comes in all styles, for every occasion and taste: chart toppers and party favourites, ancient anthems, wassailing songs, and of course, a vast selection of carols, traditional and more contemporary. The songs of the season often seem to hold an evocative or nostalgic power, and some have become so firmly connected with our celebration that it's perhaps difficult to imagine Christmas without them. I wonder what your favourites are?

A "golden oldie", "White Christmas" is likely still to be included in this year's playlists. I'm guessing though that here in Scilly, dreaming may be as close as I get to snow! The best-selling Christmas single to date, Bing Crosby's performance of "White Christmas" first aired on the radio on Christmas Day, 1941. In the midst of War and the aftermath of Pearl Harbour, the context adds another layer of meaning, taking us beyond wishful thoughts of a magically snow-transformed Christmas landscape. The words of the song convey a deep longing for a brighter future for all people and a world free from war.

Following November's COP26 Summit, and with the increasing awareness of just how critical climate issues now are, hope for the world's future is surely well expressed through initiatives encouraging us to commit to a "**Green Christmas**". At a time of the year when wastage of food and packaging is known to increase dramatically, keeping a "Green Christmas" includes a call to be careful and thoughtful in our buying.

Within the Methodist Church, the Cornwall and Isles of Scilly Synod has pledged to become an Eco-District, committed to minimising the negative impact of our Church practices on the environment. As with every pledge, signing up is the easy part. Changing established patterns and lifestyles is altogether more challenging! What better time or way though, to demonstrate the angels' message of universal peace and goodwill than by trying to keep a "green-er" Christmas? Another recent initiative that's been taken up by some Churches is "Blue Christmas". It too, stems from the imperative to care for

one another in a spirit of goodwill, sensitivity and grace. Blue Christmas aims to raise awareness of how the festive season can be a difficult time and that in all kinds of ways, Christmas can magnify some painful realities including loneliness, grief, stress and the sheer exhaustion of trying to meet expectations. It seems to me rather sad that there should be need for a reminder of the call to be inclusive. Perhaps though, Blue Christmas brings a timely challenge to us all, urging us to be especially alert to the experiences and emotions of those around us.

However we come to Christmas this year, whatever our dreams or fears, may there be blessing and hope in the message of God's coming among us, in Jesus – God with us, in solidarity and love. May the story fill us again with wonder; may we know it to be true; and may our lives and words make it real and true for our time and place and for all the world.

#### Action for Children Income 2020/21

It's good to report a more successful year of fund raising for Action for Children. Although CAMEO were unable to meet and make their usual donation because of Covid-19 restrictions, I was able to resume selling books and allotment produce from boxes on the roadside. A total of £623-87 has been banked, in addition to the proceeds from Christmas worship, which Sue Williams sends separately.

I would like to thank all those who have supported Action for Children in any way – home collection box holders, providers of books, Alan (for excess rhubarb and tomatoes and even a few mackerel!), and importantly those who have purchased through donation. A special mention for my neighbours Ivor and Eileen Martin, who managed the boxes when we were away for two plus weeks in May. Also, Gwen's daughter who found a pleasing sum in a collection box when sorting through things at Bishop View. As many readers know, Gwen worked tirelessly for this charity over a period of many years.

Between April 4<sup>th</sup> and September 15<sup>th</sup> there were very few days when I didn't find some money in the roadside boxes, the least 5p and the most £16-45! An interesting observation this year was how many adults were buying dated Enid Blyton books, several at a time, presumably as collectors editions or to perhaps re-sell on e-bay. Jacky gave me many children's books before her move, and she has since told me that some were actually hers, not just her children's! Beryl also gave me Enid Blyton books dating from her now adult daughters.

Please can I once again ask you to save unwanted paperbacks until next spring, when I will willingly collect and resume fund raising. I had to stop a bit earlier than usual this year as I had exhausted the supply, despite several people having 'clear outs' during the lockdowns and bringing me books.

If you would like a home collection box, please contact me. The needs of vulnerable young people have certainly not diminished and every bit of loose change helps to support a charity who have had to cut fund raising/admin staff as a result of the pandemic.

#### And there were shepherds

Luke's story of the birth of Jesus is brilliantly told – the angel's visit to Mary to tell her she would be mother of the long-promised Messiah, the old priest in the Temple told by another angel that his wife would have a son to be called 'John', who would prepare the people of Israel for that event, and then Mary and Joseph making the 60 mile journey from Nazareth to Bethlehem, as required by the Roman census. When they got there, no room at the inn, and they settled instead for a convenient stable, where Mary gave birth to a boy child.

Suddenly, Luke changes the tone. 'And there were shepherds ...' – that's what he actually wrote, just like that. 'And there were shepherds', doing exactly what shepherds do, looking after their flocks by night. But this night was different: yet another angelic message – a call to abandon their sheep and go into Bethlehem to see the baby Messiah. They were given directions and a 'sign' to identify Him. He would be lying in a feeding trough. Well, at least they would recognise that.

And why the shepherds, in this glorious story of our salvation? Because the event needed witnesses, and the chosen witnesses would be this bunch of scruffy, smelly shepherds straight from the sheeppen. Nothing could speak more eloquently of God's purpose than that. This was not a Saviour for the strong, rich and powerful, but for everybody. The carpenter and his wife guarded the Saviour of the world, and the very first witnesses were not kings or priests but a handful of shepherds.

#### What a Christmas

The Bethlehem manger, shepherds, wise men, Jesus, Mary and Joseph – it's all so familiar to older people, who are shocked to hear that younger generations may be hazy or ignorant of them. Aren't they part of everyone's education?

Yet the first Christmas was restricted to just a few. What 21st Century Christians proclaim as the most significant event in history began in a remote corner of the Roman Empire, without the pomp and publicity we associate with kingship and power. What modern media have called 'The Greatest Story Ever Told' escaped everyone's attention in first century Palestine.

This year, Christmas is going to be a busier celebration than last year, but probably not yet back to the normal fuss we usually make each December. The streets will be crowded, but shops may struggle with supplies. Parties will take place, but many people will feel reluctant join in. Family gatherings are allowed again, but the vulnerable may hesitate. Christmas services will be held, but as singing has the potential for droplet and aerosol transmission, music will be muted this year. A Christmas without many carols!

Many will struggle to hold their 'usual' Christmas. Yet God does not neglect us. This may be the very opportunity to rekindle or deepen our faith in what really matters about Christmas. Away from the hordes, perhaps completely alone this Christmas, we may sit quietly and allow our heavenly Father to draw near to us. We may picture Mary inviting us to gaze with her at her Son, born to save us from our sins. In the silence of our imagination, we may join the chorus of angels announcing His birth to the shepherds:

"Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace to those on whom His favour rests."

It was that chorus which inspired an American Minister, Edmund Sears, to write the Christmas hymn, 'It Came Upon a Midnight Clear'. Sears, troubled by the world's turbulent history and failure to hear the Christmas message, was himself recovering from a breakdown. Written in 1849, his words have a timeless ring about them:

Yet with the woes of sin and strife The world has suffered long; Beneath the angel-strain have rolled Two thousand years of wrong; And man, at war with man, hears not The love-song which they bring; Oh, hush the noise, ye men of strife, And hear the angels sing.

#### Good News - What a Friend we have in Jesus

This hymn came into my mind. What a comfort! Then this, perhaps less well-known hymn came into my mind. I can do no better than to quote it:

I've found a friend, Oh such a friend!
He loved me ere I knew Him; He drew me with the cords of love,
And thus He bound me to Him;
And round my heart still closely twine
Those ties which naught can sever,
For I am His, and He is mine,
Forever and forever.

I've found a friend, Oh such a friend!
He bled, He died to save me;

#### **A Christmas Gift**

It's not easy getting the right Christmas present for others, especially in these uncertain times. However, the Magi's gifts were entirely appropriate and help us to understand God's gift of Jesus to us.

'On coming to the house, they saw the child with His mother Mary, and they bowed down and worshipped Him. Then they opened their treasures and presented Him with gifts of gold and of incense and of myrrh.' (Matt 2:11). These were the expensive kind of gifts that visitors from the east would bring: gold, frankincense (a plant gum resin used in incense) and myrrh (another resin used in perfumes). Who is He?

Gold is a gift for a king. In Jesus, we see a king in baby clothes. The worship of the wise men was costly, not only in terms of their gifts but for their lives.

Why did He come?

Frankincense was used by the priests in the temple in offering sacrifices. Jesus, as the ultimate priest, is the one who came to bring God and man together. He could do this because He is both divine and human.

What did it cost Him?

Myrrh was used to embalm the dead. This gift reminds us that the baby of Bethlehem would die on the cross to give His life for us. The wood of the crib and the cross are the same wood!

What are we going to offer Him this Christmas? Jesus is *Christ*, the king who comes to rule our lives; He's *Lord*, the One who knows what it's like to be human as well as divine; and He's *Saviour*, who enables us to be friends of God.

#### How Father Christmas got where he is today

One person you are bound to run into this Christmas season is Father Christmas. These days he seems to frequent shopping malls and garden centres. If he looks tired, just remember that he has been around a long time and gone through a lot of transformations.

Father Christmas wasn't always the red-suited, white-bearded star of the retail trade that he is today. He began life as Nicholas, born way back about AD260 in Patara, an important port on the southern coast of what is now Turkey. When his parents died and left him a fortune, Nicholas gave it away to the poor. He became a bishop of the nearby city of Myra, where he almost certainly suffered persecution and imprisonment at the hand of the Roman Emperor Diocletian.

Nicholas was a serious theologian: he was a participant at the First Council of Nicaea, which formulated the Creed which we still say today. He even, reportedly, slapped another bishop in a squabble over the exact nature of the Trinity.

Nicholas died in Myra about AD343, but the stories of his generosity and kindness were just beginning. One enduring tale tells of the three girls whom he rescued from certain prostitution by giving them gold for their dowries. When the father confronted him to thank him, Nicholas said he should thank God alone.

In the UK, Nicholas became the basis for Father Christmas, who emerged in Victorian times as a jolly-faced bearded character. Meanwhile, Dutch and German settlers had taken him to America with them as Sinter Klaas and Sankt Nicklas.

It was in America that Nicholas received his final two great breaks into real stardom. The first was when the Rev Clement C Moore, a New York Episcopal minister, turned from his life-work of writing a Hebrew/English lexicon, to write a fun poem for his children one Christmas. His 'The Visit of St Nicholas' is now universally known by its first line: 'T'was the Night Before Christmas'.

From Clement Moore we discovered that St Nicholas is round and pink-cheeked and white-bearded, and that he travels at night with sleigh, reindeer and a sack of toys on his back. It was Clement Moore who also revealed that St Nicholas enters houses down chimneys and fills children's stockings with toys and sweets.

So how did we find out that Father Christmas wears red? That was the US Coca-Cola advertising campaign of 1931, who finally released the latest, up-to-date pictures of Father Christmas:

wearing a bright red, fur-trimmed coat and a large belt.

These days, it is good that Father Christmas uses reindeer and doesn't have to pay for petrol. In order to get round all the children in the world on Christmas Eve, he will have to travel 221 million miles at an average speed of 1279 miles a second, 6,395 times the speed of sound. For all those of us who are already exhausted just rushing around getting ready for Christmas, that is a sobering thought.
