Thoughts from The Manse......

Dear Friends,

Not as many letters now as 10 years ago - replaced by texts or emails. Conversations/chatting is less, some argue, as a result.

When we receive a letter we may ask:

- 1. **Who is it from**? Clues might include the postmark, handwriting, the words of the letter, but more importantly the signature.
- 2. What does it say? It may contain all kinds of news/ gossip and some views.
- 3. **What does it involve**? Usually a reply/response, even if it isn't an invitation to a special event with RSVP on it.

The Apostle Paul wrote to Christians in Corinth (2 Corinthians 3 v2-3) "You are our letter, written on our hearts to be known and read by you all and you show that you are a letter of Christ...written not with ink, but the spirit of the living God, not on tablets of stone, but on....human hearts".

A response to a letter will need an envelope, a stamp and the Royal Mail Postal Service.

The same 3 questions may be asked of us about the Christian Faith. We can respond to **Who is it from**? by saying all that Christ means to us, and the fact of Him being 'The Churches' one foundation.

We can indicate that Christianity has lots to say about many issues in the world but that it supremely speaks of Christ's love for everyone and the difference He can make in individual lives as we know His love.

Our response to this is our involvement. We accept what Christ has done for us (and for everyone) and commit ourselves to Him.

Would Paul be able to say of us, that we are Living Letters equipped and empowered by the Holy Spirit? May we be Living Letters for Christ through Lent and beyond.

26 February - Ash Wednesday: My memory of the Passover in Jerusalem by David Winter

At the end of this month Ash Wednesday introduces the Christian preparation for Easter, which normally coincides with Passover, the major Jewish celebration of the year. It's near Easter because Jesus was crucified at Passover, having just shared this very meal with his disciples.

Passover celebrates and recalls the Israelites' escape from slavery in Egypt. Led by Moses they crossed the Red Sea and 40 days later entered the 'Promised Land.' They shared the Passover meal at their last night in Egypt and have kept it all for nearly the past three thousand years or so that have followed.

Many years ago, when I was in Jerusalem to produce a radio programme, I was invited to join a Jewish family for their Passover meal. It was a great occasion, very like our Christmas, a family event with deep religious significance for those who seek it. At the meal in Jerusalem we ate modest lentils and unleavened bread – Matzos as we now call it. We also drank plenty of wine but not from the cup at the end of the table. That is 'Elijah's cup', only to be drunk from when the prophet comes to announce the arrival of the Messiah.

At the last supper Jesus instructed His disciples to drink from that cup after supper, which may have shocked them at the time. The Messiah had come!

We must be ready to allow ourselves to be interrupted by God. Dietrich Bonhoeffer

NEWS from ST. MARTIN'S

Islanders next came together for the carol service in the Anglican Church, the Rev. Canon Gay led the service and it was a joyful time as we sang and listened to the familiar carols and readings and then shared some refreshments together.

The traditional Christmas Tree Party followed on the Saturday. This is a party organised by Chapel Members for the children of the Island – it is always a very busy but happy afternoon. Games are played, the children all sit around a large table for tea (this is lovely to see!) and Father Christmas pays a visit before tired children and helpers go home. Voluntary donations are given which goes to Action for Children and this year £94.30 was raised.

The carol service in the Chapel on the Sunday was very well attended but unfortunately due to the weather the Rev. Michael Pullan and Heather (Heather in consultation with Michael organises this service) and Alan were not able to get across. Chris stepped in to lead the service and observed that it was only the second time in thirty six years that he had had to lead the Carol service. We were privileged to have some talented young musicians play their instruments for us at the beginning and end of the service which was appreciated. The singing of the carols was enthusiastic and joyful and the readings recounting the story of that first Christmas were well read.

A time of fellowship with mince pies and tea followed the service plus the singing of Happy Birthday to two of our Community!

The collection at this service was donated to the St. Petroc's Society who help and support the homeless in Cornwall and raised \pounds 201.45.

It was good to see family and friends home for Christmas and now some of our Members are travelling to various parts of the world for their holidays. Valerie and Graham (Val normally writes these notes) are visiting their son in Australia, Jackie has gone to Mexico and Barbara is on a cruise around South America leaving from and returning to Southampton. We wish them happy times and safe travelling.

Some of the angels are in charge of helping heal sick animals and pets. And if they don't make the animals get better, they help the kid get over it. Vicky, aged 8


What I don't get about angels is why, when someone is in love, they shoot arrows at them. Sarah, aged 7

Blessed Assurance

Blessed assurance, Jesus is mine:

O what a foretaste of glory divine! Heir of salvation, purchase of God; born of His Spirit, washed in His blood *This is my story, this is my song, praising my Saviour all the day long; this is my story, this is my song, praising my Saviour all the day long.* **Perfect submission, perfect delight,** visions of rapture burst on my sight; angels descending, bring from above echoes of mercy, whispers of love. **Perfect submission, all is at rest,** I in my Saviour am happy and blest, watching and waiting, looking above, filled with His goodness, lost in His love.

This hymn (Mission Praise 59), was written by Frances Van Alstyne, better known to us as Fanny Crosby. She died in 1915 at the age of 95 - her long life radiated the 'blessed assurance' she enjoyed.

Fanny Crosby wrote about 9,000 hymns and, despite being blind from the age of three, devoted her life to serving the dropouts and drunks of New York's inner city missions; and to transposing the great spiritual truths into singable rhyme and melody, She demonstrated a confidence in Christ; had a stunning memory - her poems were composed and edited in her mind, then dictated. She only accepted two dollars for each composition - choosing to live simply. Fanny met Alexander Van Alstyhe at a blind college and they married in 1858.

Most of her songs refer to seeing, watching and looking. She took Christ's command to watch and pray seriously; and once declared "My eyes of faith are vigilant. I remain alert and enthusiastic in the master's work, in view of His return. Among the many blessings that will bring will be peace and joy. His coming will give hearing to the deaf, healing to the lame and, not least, sight for the blind."

"Blessed Assurance" is based on Colossians 2 verses 2 and 3. And, as we sing "This is my story, this is my song..." May that be our experience. *Michael Pullan*

Lent – a good time to deepen your prayer life

Lent is a time to take stock of ourselves spiritually. This includes setting aside extra time for prayer.

People have been praying since Adam had a grandson named Enosh. The Bible tells us (Genesis 4:26) that it was during his days when 'men began to call on the name of the Lord'. They have been doing it ever since.

People have had their prayers answered by God since Genesis, too. But if you want to read some beautiful prayers – and answers to them, browse through the Psalms. Again and again the psalmist writes: "the Lord heard my cry".

So – what do you need to bring to prayer? Just the tiniest amount of faith that God is even there.... Jesus assures us that even faith as big as a tiny mustard seed will be effective.

What gives you the right to come before Almighty God? Jesus does. The Bible is clear that "there is one mediator between God and men, the man Jesus Christ". (1 Timothy 2:5)

The Bible makes clear that God does not stand on ceremony – in fact, He prefers our personal, spontaneous prayers. Jesus was very matter of fact about it: "When you pray, go into your room, close the door and pray to your Father, who is unseen. Then your Father, who sees what is done in secret, will reward you." (Matthew 6:6)

The Bible assures us that prayer will bring us good things: "we may receive mercy and find grace to help us in our time of need". (Hebrews 4:16)

Above all, prayer must be made with a pure heart. "If I had cherished sin in my heart, the Lord would not have listened." (Psalm 66:18) That simply means that if you know you are doing something wrong, and intend to keep right on doing it, don't waste your time praying.

What can be the results of your prayers this Lent? Well, here are seven, for starters....

1. Joy and deep happiness. (John 16:24)

2. Relief from your worry, stress and tension (Philippians 4:6,7)

3. Wisdom and more mental clarity (James 1:5,6)

4. Protection and deliverance from temptations (Matthew 26:41)

5. An ability to share the Good News of Jesus to other people (Matthew 9:38)

6. Strength to persevere when you feel under spiritual attack (Ephesians 6:18)

7. A growing thankfulness to God who is worthy of all glory (Revelations 4:11) *Rev John Tyler*
