

Over the past few weeks I have been spending a great deal of time seeking how God's Holy Spirit may be leading us, His Church to best serve this island community.

Most days I find that time after time I am led to the words of Paul, and in particular to the phrase that he uses in many places.... And that phrase is 'One Another!'

He says 'Love one another; Care for one another; Pray for one another; Share hospitality with one another; Honour one another; Be at peace with one another; And teach one another....... and the list goes on. All of this, of course, is based upon Paul's vision of the Church being' The Body of Christ' and being 'Truly One' in our faith in Jesus! This, according to Paul, is the 'only way' of being church.

About thirty years ago by chance I found myself living near a top Civil Servant who was some sort of 'personal assistant' to the then Prime Minister, and told a remarkable story.

One day this man was sent to buy a stopwatch for use in Number 10, so a visit was made to Bond Street to buy a good quality stop watch. The Prime Minister, before putting the watch to use had its accuracy checked by another member of staff, and it was found that over a period of five minutes this stop watch was one second out!

The watch was returned and exchanged for another watch. This second watch was again checked, and this watch again was shown to be out by just one second over a period of five minutes. Over a period of a number of weeks this went on, and not one watch was found to be completely accurate. The manager of the shop in the end said..."does it really matter...is it really important if this watch is just 'one three-hundreth out of time!" And the then Prime Minister was accused of 'nit picking' and making a fuss over nothing.

As a church if we are not truly 'One in Jesus' are we 'Fit For Purpose?'

If we do not care for one another, or forgive one another, or pray for one another, or completely love one another.......Are we fit for purpose? Unity in the church depends on 'every one of us......a stop watch that is just one second out in three hundred is not fit for purpose, and we too need to be in 'total unity' to be seen as 'The Body of Christ' in this world and in this community today.

In May the Rev. H. Barrie Morris visited these Islands with his wife Elizabeth. At the Friday evening fellowship a large gathering heard Barrie speak about being united by 'The Word of God'.

On the Saturday evening Barrie and Elizabeth spoke about the church in Central Africa, and despite the fact that there were fewer at this meeting nearly £100 was given to the Uganda charity which had been agreed at our annual church meeting. Our unity and our sense of caring for 'One Another' is for all who are our brothers and sisters 'In Jesus'. We continue to pray for those who are denied the many things we so often take for granted.

Finally I end this letter by saying thank you for the ministry of our Anglican priest Father Guy Scott, who leaves Scilly this summer to continue his ministry amongst the people of Biggleswade in

Bedfordshire. In the days to come we will continue to pray for Father Guy and his wife Kate and their wonderful daughters. Over the past year Guy has been most kind to Mary and myself, we have enjoyed fellowship, and I will miss Guy here on the Islands as a fellow minister and as a friend.... Guy if you read this do please know the love of your Methodist friends, and every blessing to you and your family in the exciting time that is now before you!



I end by urging you to read from Paul's 12th chapter of his letter to the Romans..... it is short and to the point. When you have read it read it again!!!!!! There is no other way to be church than to 'Be One in Christ Jesus!'

Whatever you are doing in the month of July, trust in God, and be open to Him to bless you in the mighty name of Jesus!

I remain by the grace of God, the Methodist Minister on these fine islands..... May the love of God continue to be seen in our love of one another!.

July is the month in which we think and pray about the work of the charity Action For Children, started by Methodists nearly 150 years ago. Every year the second Sunday in July is celebrated nationally in the Methodist Church. Here in the Isles of Scilly we will as usual be so doing on July 11th with a special action for usual be so doing on July 11... with a special contribution during our 11.00am Communion service.

Since changing the name recently from National Children's Home the organisation has launched a big appeal, even advertising the campaign on TV, to help children and teenagers suffering with dire consequences for their young lives.

The true measure of a nation's standing is how well it attends to its children – Their health and safety, their material security, their education and socialization, and their sense of being loved, valued and included in the families and societies into which they are born. (Unicef 2007)

What is meant by neglect?

Neglect is the persistent failure to meet a child's basic needs and it's likely to result in the serious impairment of the child's health or development. It can be harder to recognise than other forms of child abuse because it is often the symptom of other long-term and complex problems in a family rather than an easily recognisable one-off event. Neglect comes in many guises. Some of the following, observed over a period of time may be indicators:

- + a child who frequently goes hungry
- + a child who regularly goes to school in dirty clothes
- + a child who is not taken to the doctors when ill
- + a child who is frequently left unsupervised and lives in a dirty home
- + a child who does not feel loved

What is Action for Children doing? We're aiming to raise £17m over the next three years. We want to:

- + develop new, **mobile services** to reach out to children who don't use services we already have
- + develop a programme to involve *fathers* more in mainstream services
- + develop a programme to tackle **poor nutrition** in all our family support services
- + develop **UK wide programmes** to tackle other specific aspects of neglect and to enhance the skills of **our family support workers**

Encourage governments to invest in a policy of early intervention **We trust that our people here in the Circuit** and visitors in our congregations will wish to contribute to the Appeal, for which envelopes will be available in the pews.

Later in the month, on Thursday July 22nd, we will be having our Coffee Morning in the Atlantic Hotel from 10.00am until 11.45am.

There will be the usual cake stall to which we ask our grand team of cooks to contribute generously. We should like to have Bric –a-Brac Items to sell as well.....so please have a look for something you could donate.

We can surely help to make a difference to the lives of sadly deprived youngsters.

Forgiveness

What a feast we have had with visiting speakers recently. not only have they given us valuable teaching during the week but occasionally also in our Sunday worship. One occasion stays in my mind and that is the sermon given by the Revd. Professor Peter Stephens.

He spoke powerfully from the Word of God about 'Forgiveness'.

How true that teaching was and worthy of a wider audience than just those who heard it in the flesh!

Perhaps the most obvious point that he made was that when ever we say the Lord's Prayer we make the petition 'to forgive us our trespasses 'AS WE FORGIVE THOSE WHO TRESPASS AGAINST US' but often forget that our forgiveness is conditional on our forgiveness of others.

He spoke that we must also **FORGET** the hurts (or Trespasses, against us) and not let them stay in our hearts How often do we need to be reminded **to take our troubles to the foot of the cross and leave them there** instead of still wanting to keep carrying the burden of them ourselves!

I never fail to remember that wonderful passage in Pilgrim's Progress by John Bunyan taken from the modern edition.

`Now in my dream I saw that the highway along which Christian was to travel was closed in on either side by a wall, and that wall was called Salvation. So up this road burdened Christian ran, but not without great difficulty because of the load on his back.

He ran till he came to a slight upward slope, on the top of which stood a cross. A little below it, at the bottom, was a tomb. I saw in my dream that just as Christian came up to the cross his burden came loose from his shoulders, and fell off his back. It began to tumble downhill, and continued rolling till it came to the mouth of the tomb, where it fell in, and I saw it no more.

How glad and light hearted Christian was! With a happy heart he said" He has given me rest by his sorrow, and life by his death" Then he stood for a while to look and wonder. He found it very surprising that the sight of the cross should ease him of his burden like this. He gazed and gazed till the springs in his head sent tears down his cheeks."

What great joy and freedom it is to know that we can do the same and know the same relief enabling us to become the people He wants us to be.

Prayers – Faith in Action

I have long been convinced, but recently more so, that prayer is definitely a two way conversation with God. In that **we** cannot pray without listening to God and seeing if our prayer for situations isn't directed back for **our** action. The temptation of prayer is to think that once made it requires no action on our part, as if God will find somebody else to fulfil the need expressed by us.

As many of you know recently I was in Scotland , visiting my sister. Last year she spent a long time in hospital, eight weeks in total, away from her home and yet every day she had a visitor from her church. I thought that was very special and I can't help thinking how wonderful it was that people had not only prayed for Beryl but made a long journey, over 40 miles , to visit her. Faith in action despite the distance.

Heavenly Father, help us as we pray for others to see that often you want **us** to answer the needs expressed in our prayers. Thanks be to God. Mary Ratcliffe

"That's at our house," James protested. "This is grandma's house, and she can cook!"


Out of the mouths of babes....
