Some thoughts from St Mary's Manse for the month of July

As I sit in my fine study to write this monthly letter it is the middle of June. Over the past few weeks it has been a great joy to welcome so many visitors to our chapels, both on St Martin's and here on St Mary's. The other Sunday on St Mary's seemed like a bumper week as there were so many Christian friends from the churches on the mainland. There were friends from all denominations both at our morning services and again at our 8 pm act of worship with so many showing delight to end the day in chapel singing some proper hymns and hearing the promises of our Sovereign God... Yes our faith is indeed a very precious thing.

On a Sunday evening after the service we love to invite these folk back to the manse for refreshments. It is very good to hear what is going on in other places, what other churches are doing, and how they see the mission of their local church. The other week there were an interesting couple from North Devon, the husband was a worker for the Faith Mission, and his wife had worked for many years for Tear Fund. It was so good to speak with this chap from the Faith Mission; I was able to catch up with news of others whom I have known over the years involved with this work and I was delighted when he said that it may be the case that next year the Faith Mission will visit Scilly..... watch this space

As I sat thinking about all of this, and what a joy it is to greet these fellow Christians as friends, my mind was taken to those words in St John's Gospel where Jesus is with His Disciples in the upper room. He says to them

"I no longer call you servants. Instead I call you friends".

How do we decide who are our friends and who are not? Are they those who share the same interests as us , those who think like us, and what drives us to make friends with some but avoid closeness with others? Is friendship something we earn or is it something that happens? What is friendship and why is it so important to us all? What is the opposite to friendship? Who are the people whom we do not consider as friends? How do we react to those who are not in our chosen circle? What judgements do we make about others and why is it there are those who we just cannot see as being friends? Is it that they are quite simply not like us, or is it that somehow we feel that they don't deserve our friendship?

John is the only New Testament writer who gives us such detail about what Jesus said to His Disciples on the night he was betrayed by a friend and was arrested. It is John who tells us how Jesus takes upon Himself the role of a servant and washes the feet of His disciples. It is John who tells us of how He sees their despair and offers them hope, and it is John who records for us how Jesus calls them His friends, despite their shortcomings. Such is God's grace to those who do not deserve to become the friends of God!

John of course, reveals to us the truth about God. He tells us that God is not just the Lord of creation and the Lord of forgiveness – but that He is supremely a God of grace! We may not deserve to be counted as His friends, but we are. For in Jesus He gives to each of us a promise that is there for all to receive by faith. Yes, as Jesus reminded His disciples on their last evening together, His Cross has the power to make all things new, and now we His church are today called to give testimony to the Amazing Grace of God.

The great Apostle Paul speaks of God's grace on almost one hundred occasions in his letters to the early church; to Paul, grace is the very bedrock of our precious Christian faith. He speaks of how God's grace brings freedom to our lives. He speaks of a life that is freed from legalism and ritual, and he speaks of a different way of living, which enables us to take the risk of Holy living that is in keeping with the generosity and character of a loving and forgiving God. According to Paul, this is the very proof of God's grace in the world today and so it is that God shows His grace to us and calls us friends. Grace is at the very heart of God's almighty plan. It is displayed for all to see on the Cross of Jesus, and the blessings of the Kingdom of Heaven become a reality when we, like Paul, seek to live a life of grace.

But how graceful are we, especially in the face of adversity? How do we react when we are let down by others? Is our way the way of Jesus, and are our lives built on the firm foundation of God's grace, and the solid rock of Jesus? Whenever we seek the easy way, and fail to take up our cross and follow, we are denying the grace of God. Whenever we look the other way in the face of suffering, or lack the courage to befriend the friendless, we are denying the grace of God. Whenever we evade our responsibilities and deny the Lord's provision, we are denying the grace of God. Whenever we are quick to condemn and slow to forgive, we are denying the power of the Cross, and we are living lives that are empty of God's grace to us in Jesus! Maybe the only hope for this world, and for the future of our church, is to be found in us rediscovering the grace of God.

On Sunday 10th July we celebrate the anniversary of our chapel here on St. Mary's in a special act of worship led by Len Michell and Neil Didlick

On Sunday 17th we welcome the much acclaimed opera singers John and Krenulla Moorman. They will be singing one evening during the week at a special charity event on Bryher. Look out for details of this; it will be a grand event you must not miss. John and Krenulla worship at a Methodist church in Norfolk, where John is a local preacher. Both he and Krenulla will be taking part in the 11am service on St. Mary's, the 6pm service on St. Martin's, and at a very special celebration Songs of Praise at St. Mary's. I am really looking forward to hearing them both on the 17th in these acts of worship

In the evening of Sunday 24th at 8pm we will be holding our annual Lifeboat Service on St. Mary's. led by myself, and includes a message by Canon Peter Walker.

I end by sending our best wishes and prayers to Philip Michell, who is to be ordained as a priest in the Church of England on the mainland. Introducing the President of the Methodist Conference, Leo Osborn

The Revd Leo Osborn begins his office as President of the Methodist Conference on Saturday 3 July when the Conference meets in Southport. His answers to these questions give you an impression of the man behind the role.

Why have you chosen your theme - "Caring as Disciples of Jesus"?

It really springs from the words in Colossians 1:17 where Paul tells us that "In Christ all things hold together". One of the best ways in which we can model that to a fragmented world is through the quality and breadth of our care. But it will only ring true when, within the church, we are holding on to each other and being held together by Christ in our disciples

What are your hopes and dreams for the Methodist Church?

There is so much that excites me about being a Methodist Christian. Sometimes I think we tend to be envious of other Churches who we think excel in worship, preaching, evangelism, concern for the poor and marginalised and so on. But often a Church may be strong in one of these areas and weak or unconcerned in another. Yet we want to say that all these things and more besides are important, and although we don't always get it right I value so much a Church that has helped to shape me as I hope a 'rounded' Christian. I wish we could celebrate this 'roundedness' a bit more!

What do you think are the greatest challenges facing the Methodist Church today?

We are still sometimes afraid to take risks lest we get things wrong and are not always ready to trust those whom God through the Church has called to lead us to do so! But perhaps the greatest challenge is how to proclaim the gospel we sing that 'we have ... to proclaim' in a world that is changing more rapidly than many of us care to admit. Because I still believe this gospel is worth proclaiming, I hope this year to learn from those who are doing so in new and creative ways.

Representative to Synod

Twice a year, in May & September, our Church sends representatives to Truro to attend Synod on behalf of our Circuit. A vacancy has arisen for one of our members to attend, and this is an opportunity for someone to experience the wider Church. Synod is more than a business meeting, and would be a great source of encouragement to anyone wishing to meet and worship with other Christians from around the county.

Why have your chosen your theme - 'Learning as disciples of Jesus'?

Well, you have to take into account the incoming president's theme alongside it – together we have chosen 'Learning and Caring as disciples of Jesus'. Those who are familiar with *Our Calling*, which has been encouraging congregations to examine their faithfulness to the work of God, will recognise it as one of the four themes. Learning has always been a passion for me. I trained as a teacher of science, and taught for some years. At the same time my church involvement was with young people on a Sunday morning and evening, and I loved the journeys of faith exploration we made together. Then for eight years I worked as a training and development officer in my own Methodist district – I love to see people gaining new understanding and skills, and growing in their faith. I am still involved in this kind of work, and hope to be able to continue it as part of my vice-presidential role.

What are your hopes and dreams for the Methodist Church?

That we can be a 'learning Church', reflecting on our situation and experience, so that we nurture that which is of the kingdom and embrace change where we need to be different and do things differently. I believe we still have much to offer to people if we are faithful to our Methodist

ethos (or 'charisms' as our general secretary puts it) in a way that is culturally relevant.

What do you think are the greatest challenges facing the Methodist Church today?

I suppose that the challenge is to do just that – to be a 'learning Church' in all that entails


