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Some thoughts from the St. Mary's Manse

July is one of the busiest months here on the Isles of Scilly, and despite the difficulties in the nation's economy there are many who still make the long and sometimes difficult journey to visit our beautiful islands.

Mary and I are now at the end of our fourth year here on St. Mary's, and have certainly enjoyed this period in our lives, and the experience of living in this unique island community. We usually take two breaks on the mainland each year, in May and October. This May, on our trip to Norfolk to be with family, we went via Aberystwyth to visit David Easton, who was the minister on Scilly before us. It was good to be with David and to worship with him in a service that he led in Welsh. He certainly seems to have mastered the Welsh language, and this month he moves from this appointment to Sterling in Scotland where he has been called to serve as Chairman of the Scotland Methodist District. David has warm memories of his time on Scilly, and sends his love to us all.

Whenever friends go on holiday, we wish them well and pray that they have safe journeys. Mary and I certainly enjoyed our time away, and had uneventful journeys until we arrived back here on St. Mary's on May 24th; what happened as we drew into the harbour, I expect we shall never forget. The tide was low, and a strong wind was blowing, and our dear old Scillonian was unable to draw alongside the quay. A second attempt was made, but it ended up with the Scillonian drifting away from the quay. As I stood on the deck, it became clear that all was not well, and as the boat drifted away from the quay it got closer and closer to the tripper and fishing boats moored in the harbour. By now it was clear even to me that something had gone seriously wrong! Slowly, as the Scillonian drifted, it ran into tripper boats and broke their mooring, causing them to drift into other boats; it was only the swift and brave action of local boatmen that brought the situation to a safe ending. A line was put to the Lioness Lady cargo boat, which pulled the Scillonian towards the harbour, as a jet boat from Bryher and the harbormaster's boat pushed from the other side to stop it drifting.

Many attempts were made to get a rope from the Scillonian to the quay, but in the end James Terry, the skipper of our medical launch, was able

to get in between the Scillonian and the quay and get the rope ashore. What could have been so much worse than it turned out was saved by the skill of our local boatmen, and all on board were truly thankful for heir heroic efforts. We on board felt helpless, and could only look on, and more than one person on board asked me to say a prayer.

In life, the unexpected does happen, and when it does we usually find that we are completely dependent on the gifts and skills of others to put things right. Those of us who know the blessings of our precious Christian faith can see this very clearly in the Gospel. When things had gone wrong in this world, we were unable to put them right. Sometimes in life we find ourselves drifting! Life seems to have lost direction, and we begin to doubt the reality and power of God, and we begin to doubt the great promises of His love, His grace, and His promise of eternal life. The Gospel reminds us of God's power and His ability to save. In Jesus, He came to share in all that makes us human; He reminded us of God's great promises, and he gave Himself to save us from all the perils of this life, that we may in all circumstances feel safe and secure in the knowledge of Life Eternal won for us on the Cross of Calvary. Yes, the unexpected can happen in our personal lives, in the lives of these beautiful islands, and in the lives of our nation. Those who follow the life and mission of our church closely are aware of the many challenges that are before us in this fastchanging world. Some are troubled by the legislation going through government regarding same sex marriage; others are troubled by the threat posed by Muslim extremism, and others by the decline in church attendance in recent decades. It is against this background that we are called to give testimony to our precious Christian faith, to live the victory won for us by Jesus, and to take up our cross and follow the way of sacrificial love.

In Luke's Gospel, we have the moving record of how John the Baptist comes to the people of his day, and calls them to be ready for the promised coming of God's kingdom. He calls those before him to look closely at their lives, and to make changes so they will be ready for the unexpected, and he reminds all who hear his message that by receiving Jesus they will know that God's promises are true, even in the great turmoils of life. John, like some of us today, had complete trust in what has sometimes been described as 'the mighty plan of God'. He was confident that by God's grace and mercy lives could be changed, that each of us can make a fresh start in our lives, and that we can be confident that at the coming of God's kingdom that the wrongs of this worlds will be put right. Through Jesus we will find safety and security in these heavenly promises, even in the face of the unexpected turmoils of our earthly lives. Yes, the incident in St. Mary's harbour on May 24th was saved by the brave and heroic action of our Scillonian boatmen, but we are reminded in the pages of the Gospel that we can know true salvation in the great challenges of life because God sent His Son Jesus to be the Saviour of this world.

It is clear as we read the Gospel that at the time appointed by God, the promised coming of His kingdom will happen! In Luke's Gospel, John the Baptist uses powerful language and images to challenge those who hear his message to be ready for the unexpected. He says 'Stop and think!', and he says 'Repent now! – for the axe is already at the root of the tree!' Yes, John warns us to be ready for the unexpected, to be ready for a new way, and to be ready for the coming of God's kingdom. For according to him, this will not be a superficial or gentle reform, but a new way and a new order which have the power to completely sweep away all that is past and enable God's people to live a new and better life.

Yes, there is thoroughness in the Gospel! It reveals the great need this world has for hope and salvation; it challenges us to look honestly at our lives, and it offers hope to all who will receive from our gracious and loving God. The message of the Gospel is clear and uncomplicated; it brings a great challenge to our lives, and to our relationships with one another, and it reminds us that even in the darkest moments of our lives, hope can be found in Jesus. We pray for safe journeys to and from our islands; we give thanks for those in our island community who are here to help us in times of difficulty, and we pray that by receiving the Good News of God's love to us in Jesus we shall each know His gift of life eternal, even in the face of the unexpected.

We thank God for all that is past, and we trust Him for all that is to come. May the blessings of His grace continue to be seen in our love of one another. I remain, by the grace of God, the Methodist minister on these remote yet beautiful islands for a while.

Friday Fellowship 21st June 2013

During the summer weeks we only meet in the Manse on Friday evenings when the preacher friends are visiting and can lead our Fellowship in religious study. John Hogarth, the Curator of the Wesley Cottage in Cornwall whilst here for a few busy days, was in charge of our meeting on 21st June.

In the years since our Lord God led the people out of Egypt they had, sadly, turned away to the worship of Baal and other local gods. In punishment God allowed the Midianites to overpower His flock and rule the land. He then chose Gideon to organise the return to true worship, but this man needed lots of convincing that he is the one to lead the movement. He is indeed a reluctant servant of the Lord! In due course, however, at God's command, Gideon destroys the altar of Baal and builds a new one to the Lord God. He does it secretly at night as he is afraid of family members and the reaction of the general populace. Then God orders him to take up arms against the Midianites, using a very small force of men and with some help from the Ephraimites. The enemy is defeated at last and the praise of the true Lord God is restored.

Then Israel had forty years of peace, during the rest of Gideon's long life. Sadly, after he died and in the long reign of his son Abimelech, the nation turned again to the worship of Baal: a weak commitment to the Almighty! Thinking about the land of Israel and those nearby with so many lethal conflicts today, we may well fear the lack of worship of our Father God in spirit and truth, as ever!

As fine silver...

Malachi 3:3 says: "He will sit as a refiner and purifier of silver." This verse puzzled some women in a Bible study. They got to wondering what this statement meant about the character and nature of God. One of the women offered to find out the process of refining silver and get back to the group. That week, the woman called a silversmith and made an appointment to watch him at work. She didn't mention anything about the reason for her interest beyond her curiosity about the process of refining silver.

As she watched the silversmith, he held a piece of silver over the fire and let it heat up. He explained that in refining silver, one needed to hold the silver in the middle of the fire where the flames were hottest, so as to burn away all the impurities.

The woman thought about God holding us in such a hot spot, and then she thought again about the verse that says: "He sits as a refiner and purifier of silver." She asked the silversmith if it was true that he had to sit there in front of the fire the whole time the silver was being refined.

The man answered that yes, he not only had to sit there holding the silver, but he had to keep his eyes on the silver the entire time it was in the fire. If the silver was left a moment too long in the flames, it would be destroyed. The woman was silent for a moment. Then she asked the silversmith, "How do you know when the silver is fully refined?"

He smiled at her and answered, "Oh, that's easy - when I see my image in it."

So if today you are feeling the heat of the fire, remember that God has his eye on you and will keep watching you. His aim is not to abandon or destroy you, but to refine you - until he sees his image in you.

Circuit Service 23rd June 2013


Low Tides and blustery weather delayed what proved to be an enjoyable time of fellowship for the Isles of Scilly Circuit.
