# SOME SUMMERTIME THOUGHTS FROM THE ST. MARY'S MANSE



I expect as you read this issue of "In Touch" that our beautiful islands will be full of visitors enjoying this unique island location, and we rejoice that we can again welcome friends from faraway places to worship with us in our chapels on St. Martin's and St. Mary's.

At the time this newsletter comes out I will not be on St. Mary's, but instead in the fine city of Birmingham where together with Steve Wild and our dear friend John Hogarth we will be representing the Cornwall District at the annual Methodist Conference which meets from 26th June until 3rd July. Sunday, 29th June is designated as 'Conference Sunday', so please do remember all who will be meeting to further the work and mission of our precious Methodist Church at this important meeting with representatives from all over the world. It has been a long time since I have been to Birmingham, but I have fond memories from my time in ministry there in the 1980's. I remember the people as being warm-hearted and friendly, and I expect there will be the opportunity for me to meet up with friends from long ago.

Over the past few months we have been welcoming special visitors from the mainland to find out more about the mission of our churches on the islands, and to connect us with the wider Methodist family. Our District Chairman, Steve Wild, was over in April to share with us some of the exciting things that are happening in the Cornwall District, and at our Friday evening meeting spoke of how new 'Fresh Expressions' of being church are proving to be key in sharing our faith with others. Also in April we were pleased to have our District Evangelists, John Hogarth and Chris Clark, with us. They shared in our Good Friday and Easter services, and John was able to attend and offer

guidance at our Circuit Meeting. These links with our Methodist Churches on the mainland are indeed of great value to us and to those who visit. Because our membership is so small, at times we need help and encouragement from others, and we rejoice in the very strong friendships we have with those on the mainland. While I was away in May, Linda Crossley, the President of M.W in B visited our islands, and we are grateful to Maria Tomlinson for providing Linda and her husband with accommodation. Linda was able to share with us at the Friday meeting on St. Mary's something about the national and world-wide work of Women in Methodism. Linda was also able to attend worship at our chapel on St. Martin's on the Sunday morning where she received a warm welcome. On the Sunday evening she was able to lead our prayers and later to speak with members and visitors at a meeting at the manse following our evening worship. Graeme Garden and his wife, Joan, were with us on the last weekend in May. Graeme is the 'National Advocate' for the M.P.W.L.T. which is a trust set up to support Methodist Local Preachers and Worship Leaders. Graeme spoke at our Friday evening meeting, and on the Sunday he led the worship on St. Martin's in the morning and on St. Mary's in the evening.

It seems to be the case now that our dear friend Professor Peter Stephens always makes an annual visit to our islands. Peter has made it quite clear that he will do all that he can to offer help and support to our island Methodists, and we are truly thankful for this. Peter, having been a past president of the Methodist Church, is a fount of wisdom and knowledge. He now lives in Penzance which means that he is close enough to come over and see us. Peter visited at the start of June, spoke at our Friday meeting on St. Mary's and led worship there on the Sunday morning, and was able to meet with friends on St. Martin's and lead worship there in the evening. Last, but by no means least, we come to the Rev. H. Barrie Morris and his wife, Elizabeth. In June they were with us for a week which meant that Barrie was able to speak at our annual Circuit Service which this year was on St. Agnes. Barrie also spoke at our Friday Fellowship evening, and led our Local Preachers and Worship Leaders' study day. All of these visits tell us something of our work as a church on these islands, and I expect it is good from time to time to stop and reflect on all that we do.

This is very much what we read in the pages of John's Gospel when midway through Jesus' ministry, some of His followers ask Him the question, "What must we do to do the work that God requires?" These words are found in the sixth chapter of John's Gospel which is one of the longest chapters in the New Testament. The chapter starts with the story of Jesus feeding 5,000 people with five small loaves and two small fish, and it ends with Jesus being almost alone, with even His disciples being bewildered by what they had witnessed and heard. Indeed, John writes, "From that time on many of His followers turned their back on Him and no longer followed." Whenever I read this verse it reminds me of the way things are in so many places today, yes it seems that there are many who no longer see the need to follow Jesus.

Those who had witnessed Jesus feeding the 5,000, the following day get into boats to find Jesus on the other side of the lake. They clearly see Jesus as some kind of prophet or miracle worker and seek Him out to witness more, but when they find Him, they do not hear or see what they expect. They are certainly taken aback when he says to them, "I tell you the truth, you are looking for me not because you saw miraculous signs, but because you ate the loaves and had your fill." He then goes on to say, "Do not work for food that spoils, but instead for that which endures unto Life Eternal!"

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The feeding of the 5,000 (which is recorded in each of the four Gospels) was a 'sign', a sign of God coming among us to meet our deepest needs, a sign of God's grace, God's power, and God's great love for His people, and a sign of how in Jesus, God our Father has come to sustain each of us with the 'Bread of Heaven' which will bring us Life Eternal.

The words spoken by Jesus to those who crossed the lake were certainly a challenge to them, and I expect that they are even more of a challenge to us today in the fast moving world in which we live.

We too, just like those who flocked to Jesus there in Capernaum, are aware of our material needs and the material needs of others, and we too, maybe, at times struggle to truly comprehend the mighty power of our Sovereign God. We look at this world and we see that great drive to find security in the material things of life, and so often our main priority in life is the material well-being of our families and those we care for. Yes, so often our time and our efforts are to this end and to this end alone. Maybe we too need to take heed of what Jesus says, and maybe we too need to be reminded of those things which spoil and fade away, and be reminded of those things of God which will endure for ever. Some have said that this is the greatest challenge that we face as the church in our nation today. So many of those around us have found hope, not in the things of God, but instead in the things of this world. In our striving for material security the things of God have been squeezed out, the church has become marginalised, and we know that so often the things of God seem very low down on the list of priorities of those around us. Yet the voice of God still is there for all who will stop and receive. Jesus still says, "I am the Bread of Life, and they who come to me will never hunger, and they who believe in me will never thirst!" We, the church of today, are still the custodians of this life-changing message of hope, and we are still those who are

called to give testimony as to how our precious Christian faith can bring us Eternal Life today. The great Apostle Paul wrote to a friend saying, "Our gain is to know God and to know contentment, for we brought nothing into this world and surely we will take nothing out except our contentment in knowing the Lord". So we give thanks to those who come to our islands to encourage us to trust in our Sovereign God, and we pray that the Holy Spirit will lead us into knowing all that God requires. May those material things in our lives mean less, and may those things of God mean more, and may we each know Jesus as The Bread of Heaven, and in knowing Him receive the gift of Life Eternal today.

I remain by the Grace of God the Methodist minister on these remote yet beautiful islands for a while.

# Leaders of Worship/ Local Preachers' Study Day

On Saturday, 14th June, through the kindness of Mary Ratcliffe, we met for our annual study day at her home under the leadership of Rev. Barrie Morris. During the day 3 Worship Leaders, 1 Local Preacher in training, 4 preachers (including Chris Savill who made it over from St. Martin's), our Minister, together with Barrie and his wife Elizabeth were present at least for some of the morning and afternoon sessions.

The morning was centred upon Acts 4: 23-47 with ideas from the magazine 'The Flame', starting with the opening statement, 'There is only one real problem in the Church of God these days, and that is the prayer life of the Church' - a challenging statement and one which might not come to mind automatically. When Barrie first asked us 'What is the problem with the life of the church today?' there were a number of suggestions usually beginning with the phrase 'A lack of .....' but we were soon led to realise that, just as in the early church, a strong prayer life both as individuals and as a group is an essential for the health and progress of any Church. We only had time in the morning to discuss 4 of the 7 statements put to us. Each one started with the words 'IN A PRAYING CHURCH ....: 1. ... there is a recognition of the supreme importance of prayer, and therefore there is a spontaneous desire. 2. ... the eyes of faith and expectancy are towards the Lord. 3. ... there is an overwhelming desire to obey the Lord's commission to evangelise the world, 4, ... there is faith to demand miracles.

**After lunch** we shared an extended Communion service which included a short reflection by Barrie. **Once again it was good** to share fellowship together outside of our agenda-led meetings, and to have Barrie's leadership and encouragement.
