Some thoughts from St Mary's Manse.......



As I sit to write this letter it is early May, it is warm and sunny, there seems to be many visitors enjoying the delights of these fine islands, and on Sunday..... the first day of the week, we are able to welcome visitors to our worship. both here on St Mary's and in our fine chapel on St Martin's. Over the past few weeks we have sung some fine Easter hymns, and this was especially the case on

Easter Sunday evening on St Mary's, at our special Easter Songs of Praise Easter hymns and anthems are special, they speak of the victory won for us on the cross of Jesus. I especially like the verses that remind us of the 'Spiritual Battle' that has been won by Jesus.

Fine examples of this are in the Wesley hymn 'Christ the Lord is risen today' (v2. line2) where we sing 'Fought the fight, the battle won' or the Thomas Kelly hymn 'Look ye saints the sight is glorious'(v1 line2) where we sing 'from the fight returned victorious', or the fine hymn of Francis Potts 'The strife is o'er the battle done'....... the title speaks for itself.

All of these hymn writers, of course, are trying to lay before us in song the victory won for us that we find in the pages of the New Testament! The whole of history was changed upon the Cross of Calvary, there a line was drawn under the past, the great mistakes, and the sins of the world were forgiven, and this victory is laid before us in the Easter story of Jesus being alive. This is the very foundation of our precious faith, it gives us the power to live our lives as victors, and heirs to all that God will provide.... Yes having faith really does make a difference to our lives! The story of Easter, the story of the battle won, and the promise that this lays before us, has the potential to make this world a very different place to what it is. Yet somehow, as we all

know, there is evidence all around us of a world, made up of people just like you and I, who just have not received this life changing message, and are living lives that are in so many ways denying this God given victory!

John in his Gospel picks up this theme and lays it before us as a 'Battle between Light and Darkness'. John like us knew the victory won by Jesus upon the Cross, indeed it is John who describes this as 'His Hour of Glorification'. John is convinced that the story of the Cross is the story of God's great love for this world, but time and time again he reminds us that the world has not fully grasped this. At the start of the Gospel he writes, "He came to His own, yet His own received Him not, and John reminds us that those who have not received the Good News of the Gospel are in effect' Living in Darkness'.

Today we are told it is not fashionable for the church to be speaking of battles and conflict, much loved hymns such as 'Onward Christian Soldiers are seldom sung because of their military overtones, but in following this line we run the risk of denying much of what the New Testament says about the task before us as a church.

Those who have listened to the Gospel, those who have understood that message of God sharing in all that makes us human, and those who have grasped the message of the Cross know that our faith is precious, indeed it would seem to me that faith in Jesus is the most precious thing that any one of us can possess.

Today we seem to be surrounded by those who seem to see little need of God's victory won for us upon the Cross. people seem to be able to live their lives without seeing any need of worship on a Sunday, or meeting together to give thanks and celebrate God's great love and provision for the world.... Maybe John is right when he speaks of people living in darkness.

Yes, the church, and all who know the precious truth about Jesus have a battle to fight. It is not a battle that is to be fought with worldly weapons, but with the weapons given to us by God. The battle we face is a spiritual battle, a battle against darkness, against lack of love, and against the spirit of gloom and despair....... A battle that has been won by God, and this victory is freely given to all who will receive.

I expect that most who read our magazine are more than familiar with what advice Paul gives to the church about this very real 'spiritual battle' upon which we as a church are in the front line. He says" Be strong in the Lord, and in His mighty power, and put on the full armour of God and take your stand! " This is certainly a reminder of the spiritual battle that we face.

God has equipped us well for battle, indeed Paul reminds each of us of the weapons we have. They are 'The Truth' of God's Word, 'The Righteousness' won for us by Jesus. 'Salvation' from the darkness of the world found in Jesus, and the gift of The Holy Spirit which by the grace of God fills us with confidence, and enables us to stand firm in this world of doubt and despair.

Peter just like us was an ordinary man, who like us made great changes to his life after meeting with Jesus. But despite this, and despite his great profession of faith, he, we are told, denied Jesus not once but three times, later, in his great Epistles to the church he, like other New Testament writers speaks both about the victory won for us on the Cross, and also of a raging spiritual battle that surrounds the church. He knew that being a follower of the Risen Christ was not easy, he knew the reality of living in the light of Jesus in a world of darkness, and he knew the stark reality of what it may mean to 'Take up our Cross and to follow'. In the battle that is before us we too are called to make sacrifices in our lives. We need to understand that in a

battle we need to stand firm, to be totally committed to just what it may mean to be the church of Jesus in this age of fast change and much doubt, and to be prepared to give testimony to our precious faith and the victory we know in our own personal lives. Frances Ridley Havergal understood this concept and in her hymn 'Who is on the Lord's side' writes 'Fierce may be the conflict, strong may be the foe, But the King's own army none can overthrow. Round His standard, raging, victory is secure, for His truth unchanging makes the victory sure!' Some may say this expresses Victorian views, but maybe it reminds us the reality of being church today.

This month we are reminded of how our precious faith reminds us of God's victory on the Cross of Jesus. Pentecost Sunday this year is on the 12th, at our 10.30 worship, led on this day by Neil Didlick and Len Michell, we will again be reminded of how in the mighty power of the Holy Spirit tells us the truth about God, and enables us to be witnesses to the empty cross today. And on Pentecost Sunday evening, at our 8pm service, we will again be reminded of the faithfulness of God to us today as we share together in the bread and wine from the Lord's Table.

Trinity Sunday this year falls on the 19th June. In the morning our Trinity Sunday worship will be led by Barbara Hasler, and in the evening, at 8pm, we will be celebrating the conquering love of God as Father, Son and Holy Spirit in a special Songs of Praise celebration worship.

We thank God for all that is past, and trust Him for all that is to come!

I remain, by the grace of God, the Methodist minister on these fine islands for a while. May our precious faith continue to be seen in our love for one another.

<u>SPRING SYNOD - 14TH MAY 2011 - TRURO METHODIST</u> <u>CHURCH (TMC)</u>

Our minister, Charlie, and myself attended the Synod on behalf of the Isles of Scilly Circuit. Unlike some previous synods we arrived with time to spare before the opening, and were able to stay until the end because, having preaching appointments in the Liskeard Circuit (see another report), we didn't have to dash off to catch a helicopter.

The emphasis was on building stronger ties with the Cornwall Diocese, affirming those things which bind us together in the family of Christ and building mutual respect and understanding in those things which we do differently. To this end, before Synod started Chairman Steve Wild met with Bishop Tim Thornton and Cannon Perran Gay in the Cathedral and processed with the cross to TMC. The cross was placed in the pulpit, and after Steve's welcome, Cannon Perran led the devotions. The theme was 'What are we doing on our own that we could be doing together?'.

Later we learnt about Epiphany House, a CofE building in Truro with a varied history of usage, including the bishop's residence and the residence of the Sisters of the Epiphany, but which is now available for 'quiet days', training courses, and retreats.

The afternoon session started with 2 short presentations bringing to our notice things which are being 'done together' with other denominations such as the work of Street Pastors in 7 towns in

Cornwall (a scheme is in preparation at Penzance) and a (continued on Page 10)

Good Friday Walk of Witness

On Good Friday we had the opportunity to join with local friends and visitors to take a long, reverential walk up to the entrance grave on Buzza Hill. After a short service at the Chapel we began our walk at the Town Hall. There we participated in the first of seven Stations of the Cross. Canon Peter Walker led our meditation based on the Franciscan tradition. Here and at each subsequent Station, he gave a Bible reading and led us in prayer and reflection. We then sang some verses from the hymn 'It is a thing most wonderful'

We then set out on our journey, with David Pender carrying the large wooden cross ahead of us. Our next stop was at the Park, followed by a gathering outside the Scillonian Club. Our fourth Station was on Holgates Green, again with a fitting Bible reading and its relevance to our lives here on Scilly. We thought of Simon of Cyrene, carrying for Jesus the heavy burden of His Cross. Our attention was drawn to several boats in the Harbour, such as the Lifeboat, and the medical Launch as examples of concern shown for others in our island's community. Philip Lethbridge now carried the cross.

Our fifth stop was at Porth Mellon where we heard of the legendary Veronica who offered her veil to Christ to mop his brow. Quite a personal risk considering the situation. This time Canon Peter highlighted the role of volunteers, always so very valuable here in many different ways.

We then took an unexpected walk to the Dump, well out of sight for most visitors, fortunately! here the connection was made with the rubbish we keep hidden in our lives and how a kind word can help when friends are troubled. We then sang some verses from' There is a green hill far away'

Our final station was at the Garden Pavilion, thinking about the women doing things for Jesus and for people here in the community. The words were said 'We adore you, O Christ and we bless You'. He did it all that we might be forgiven. Lynn Walker and Fiona Maybrey took over the burden of the cross for the last trek up the hill to Buzza. It was erected for all to see from the town, until early on Sunday morning. Christ was crucified high up, just outside the city walls of Jerusalem. We thought of those left high and dry and stripped of selfworth. Always there is the potential for new life in Christ. We kept a minute's silence, valuable at times of distress. We thought about the seeming silence of God at moments of history and natural disaster. Giving thanks for all who respond from their faith at such times.

We sang 'When I survey the wondrous cross on which the Prince of Glory died'

The whole walk having been a truly uplifting experience.

breakfast project in Penzance catering 5 days a week for the homeless in the area staffed interdenominationally.

This was followed by an address by Bishop Tim encouraging serious consideration as to whether unity or mission should be our priority. He reminded us that although statistically the Church was now a minority organization, it often 'punched above its weight' in the influence it had in society as long as 'mission' was the focus rather than arguments over church structure. The practical working out of this had been seen in the projects in Cornwall where Chairman and Bishop put aside their denominational positions and missioned together for the sake of the Gospel. After Bishop Tim had finished his address there was a short 'buzz' time when we could talk about the issues with those around us before the closing worship followed by communion. Bread was given by the Chairman and the Bishop, and the wine by young people of the church. Synod had commenced with the processional cross being carried in by a Cathedral steward; at the end it was carried out by a Methodist steward, and we all paraded out of the church and along the busy street to the front of the cathedral where there was a prayer followed by 'Thine be the Glory' struck up by Steve Wild and heartily sung by Synod members.

During the day there were the usual agenda items of matters needing to be agreed by Syond, and one or two reports relating to District activities. Also, a bouquet was presented to Lady Mary Holborrow, Lord Lieutenant of Cornwall who is to retire in September after being the Queen's representative in the County for 17yrs. The Chairman thanked her for the many occasions she had accepted invitations to be present at various Methodist events during that time.

But Steve had a surprise for her and Bishop Tim (and, indeed, for all of us) – he had written a sketch for his puppet frog 'Clarence' - a Methodist to the core, - and two other frogs, who were giving Clarence problems because one was going to a CofE church and another to a R.C. church. Its serious point was that we were all part of the family of Christ, but Synod rocked with laughter at the sight of the Bishop of Truro and the Lord Lieutenant of the County of Cornwall out at the front each with a hand up a puppet and being led along by our Chairman. I did wonder if God was laughing too – I'm sure He was.

We speak knowledgeably on subjects of which we really don't know the truth- and by so doing, we cause untold hurt.


Jesus said "He who is without sin cast the first stone" and those present left the scene one by one knowing that they too had sinned.
