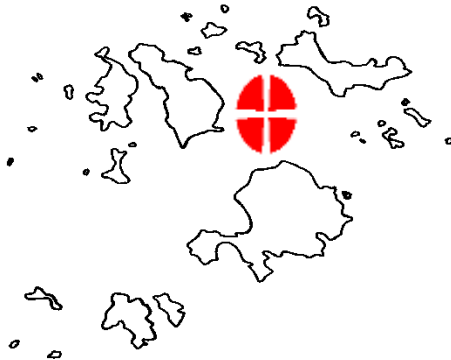

The hymn is ALL MY HOPE ON GOD IS FOUNDED: MHB70, H&P 63. Originally written in German, it was translated into English by Robert Seymour Bridges. When sung to the beautiful chorale, *Meine Hoffnung*, composed by Joachim Neander, it is one of the most powerful and moving hymns you will ever sing.

Verse 1. *All my hope on God is founded;
He doth still my trust renew.
Me, through change and chance He guideth,
Only good and only true.
God unknown,
He alone
Calls my heart to be His own.*

This verse gives us great hope if we put our trust in God.

I personally think that Bridges' original translation of verse 2, as in MHB 70 is much simpler to follow than the H&P translation.

*Pride of man and earthly glory,
Sword and crown betray his trust:
What with care and toil he buildeth,
Tower and temple fall to dust.
But God's power,
Hour by hour,
Is my temple and my tower.*

The next two verses remind us of God's great goodness towards us and His bounteous gifts to us, along with the love and joy that are ours if we trust Him.

But it is the last verse that holds a wonderful promise for us: -

*Still from man to God eternal
Sacrifice of praise be done.
High above all praises praising
For the gift of Christ His Son.
Christ doth call
One and all:
Ye who follow shall not fall.*

What a wonderful promise, Ye who follow SHALL NOT FALL!

In Praise of Knitting

Knitting can be astonishingly good for you. This gentle hobby has been found to lower blood pressure, reduce depression, keep your mind alert, slow the onset of dementia, distracts from chronic pain (such as arthritis), boost wellbeing, and reduce loneliness.

A major study by the organisation Knit for Peace has found that knitting lowers the heart rate by an average of 11 beats per minute and induces 'an enhanced state of calm.' The repetitive movement also boosts calming serotonin, which lifts your mood and dulls any pain. Knitting also boosts the reward centres of the brain, because it allows people to feel that they can still make a contribution to society.

In Britain, where the NHS spends more than £2 billion each year on blood pressure treatments, around £300 million on antidepressants, and about £26 billion on dementia, and unknown billions on various chronic pain treatments, perhaps more people should take up knitting. As one expert says: 'Research has shown that there is a growing crisis in primary care. As a skilled and creative occupation, knitting has therapeutic potential. There is an enormous amount of research showing that knitting has physical and mental health benefits'.

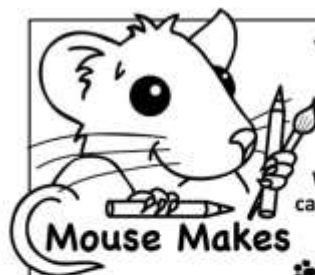
