Dear Friends

Questions, Questions – they are very much part of life for us all. Asking them in school or college or beyond is part of life's learning.



There are radio and TV programmes based on them: Any Questions, Question Time, Twenty Questions, Prime minister's Question Time etc.

The lyrics of a Moody Blues song 'Question' include 'Why do we never get an <u>answer</u> when we're knocking at the door?'

Questions need Answers (generally) – it may not always be what we want to hear or come as quickly as we would like, but answers are important.

Jesus asked questions of a number of people/groups as part of His earthly ministry:

- A) a man at the pool of Bethesda 'Do you want to get well?' (John 5; 1-18)
- B) blind Bartimaeus 'What do you want me to do for you?' (Mark 10; 46-52)
- C) to Mary Magdalene
 'Who is it you are looking for?' (John 20; 1-18)
- D) to His disciples 'Do you understand what I have done for you?' (John 13; 1-17)
- E) to Simon Peter 'Do you love me?' (3 times!) (John 21; 15-19)
- F) to a man born blind He healed 'Do you believe in the Son of Man? (John 9; 35-41)
- G) to Saul of Tarsus
 'Why do you persecute me?' (Acts 9; 1-9)
- H) to the Pharisees
 'Why does this generation ask for a sign?' then many more questions, concluding with
 'Do you not yet understand?' (Mark 8; 11-13)

Though asked to individuals or a group (and recorded in Scripture) they readily apply to us individually or as a group today

- -do you want to get well?
- -what do you want me to do for you?
- -who is it you are looking for?

- -do you understand what I have done for you?
- -do you love me?
- -do you believe in the Son of Man?
- -why do you persecute me?
- -why does this generation ask for a sign?
- -do you not understand?

We may identify with one, several or all of these questions and can say (as in the whole of life) there is always something more to learn about Jesus and from Jesus. He is with us every day as we journey with Him and we can hopefully say 'He is the answer to my/our every need'. He is a friend indeed!

Let's never stop asking questions and thinking/responding to those Jesus may ask of us -will you do this for me?

Whatever it is, God offers us a prescription to help the pain. The psalmist writes: "'God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble' (Psalm 46:1). Jesus added: 'Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest' (Matthew 11:28).

This kind of help is real and immediate and there for the asking. We don't have to put up with our dis-ease and struggle alone. God, our heavenly Father, is only a prayer away. Not just twice a day, after meals, but whenever we need him.

Good News Unchanging Saviour

It is a Sunday morning and I have just listened to the service on the radio. It was wonderful, brought tears to my eyes. The message of the Good News – old but ever new!

The Bible tells us 'God has spoken to us by His son, Jesus', whom He appointed the heir of all things, through whom also He created the world. He is the radiance of the glory of God and the exact imprint of His nature. 'He upholds the universe by the word of His power'. (Hebrews 1: vs. 2 and 3).

As if that isn't enough, I am reminded of my then future Father-inlaw at our Holy Communion service, he would often stand to read from Revelation 1: v.5 – 'To Him who loves us' – he would then pause and look up and say – 'still loves us' – then 'has freed us from our sins by His blood'.

What a magnificent message – what do we need more! We have a God who loves us and is waiting for us to come to Him in repentance, asking for His forgiveness, trusting Him, growing in faith, knowing that the Lord Jesus Christ has fully paid the price for our redemption. The story behind the hymn: 'Lord, for the years'

Lord, for the years your love has kept and guided, urged and inspired us, cheered us on our way, sought us and saved us, pardoned and provided: Lord for the years, we bring our thanks today.

Lord, for that word, the word of life which fires us, speaks to our hearts and sets our souls ablaze, teaches and trains, rebukes us and inspires us: Lord of the word, receive your people's praise.

Lord, for our hopes, the dreams of all our living, Christ and his kingdom one united aim; Rulers and peoples bound in high thanksgiving, Lord of our hopes, our trust is in your Name. ...

This well-loved hymn was written in 1967 by the Revd Timothy Dudley Smith, who later became Bishop of Thetford. He later confessed: 'I wrote it on a train when I was very pressed for time. I'm thankful if something I write gets picked up, but I suspect anyone who does something in a rush later regrets that they didn't find time to apply the sandpaper a bit more!'

Dudley Smith had been asked to write a hymn for the centenary service of the Children's Special Service Mission, now Scripture Union, in St Paul's Cathedral. His commission was to write words that could be fitted to Jean Sibelius's *Finlandia*, as it was to be accompanied by an orchestra with this tune in their repertoire. And so – `Lord for the years' was written.

Dudley Smith need not have worried about lack of time – his lyrics were a 'hit' in the cathedral on the day, and went on to become so well-loved that George Carey chose the hymn to be sung at his consecration as Bishop of Bath and Wells, and then again later, in 1991, for his consecration as Archbishop in Canterbury Cathedral.

The hymn continued to be widely sung and loved, until in 2002 Timothy Dudley Smith was asked to write an extra verse for it so that it could even be sung around the time of the Queen's Golden Jubilee.

Many of the words in the hymn are true for the Queen herself, as she celebrates her 95th birthday this month. She does indeed thank God 'for the years your love has kept and guided, urged and inspired us, cheered us on our way'...

And so indeed the 'extra' verse added for the Queen has also held true:

Lord for our hopes, the dreams of all our living, Christ and his kingdom one united aim, Rulers and peoples bound in high thanksgiving, Lord of our hopes, our trust is in your Name.

## St Swithun (or Swithin) - saint for a rainy day

St Swithun is apparently the saint you can blame for rainy summers. It is said that if it rains on his special day, 15th July, it will then rain for 40 days after that. It all began when Swithun was made Bishop of Winchester in 852 by King Ethelwulf of Wessex. It was an important posting: Winchester was the capital of Wessex, and during the 10 years Swithun was there, Wessex became the most important kingdom of England.

During his life, instead of washing out people's summer holidays, and damping down their spirits, Swithun seems to have done a lot of good. He was famous for his charitable gifts and for his energy in getting churches built. When he was dying in 862, he asked that he be buried in the cemetery of the Old Minster, just outside the west door.

If he had been left there in peace, who knows how many rainy summers the English may have been spared over the last 1000 years. But, no, it was decided to move Swithun. By now, the 960s, Winchester had become the first monastic cathedral chapter in England, and the newly installed monks wanted Swithun in the cathedral with them. So finally, on 15 July 971, his bones were dug up and Swithun was translated into the cathedral.

That same day many people claimed to have had miraculous cures. Certainly everyone got wet, for the heavens opened. The unusually heavy rain that day, and on the days following, was attributed to the power of St Swithun. Swithun was moved again in 1093, into the new Winchester cathedral. His shrine was a popular place of pilgrimage throughout the middle ages. The shrine was destroyed during the Reformation and restored in 1962. There are 58 ancient dedications to Swithun in England.
