#### Some thoughts from St Mary's Manse

I expect that my letter this month may be a little longer than usual, but as I look in my diary it is clear that there is a lot to look forward to in the month of May.

First let me just say a few things about some of the things that have happened over the last month. It was a great joy to me on Maundy Thursday to be on St Martin's, where that evening we met for a time of fellowship. Members brought along poems and thoughts, those present were in good voice, and the singing was superb. Hot cross buns were served, and in the midst of all this we were reminded of the last evening that Jesus was with his disciples before His cruel death the following day. Somehow the chapel on St Martin's seemed a perfect setting for this event. If you have not been to our chapel on St Martin's for a while, make a point of visiting over the summer months, I do assure you that if you come on a Sunday you will be sure to get a warm welcome from our Methodist friends on that island.

On St Mary's a Passover Meal was shared on the Wednesday of Holy Week. The previous Sunday Trevor Adams had spoken of Passover at our evening worship and this event organised by William and Trish Thomas brought it all to life. This was indeed a blessing to all those who were present.

Good Friday on St Mary's was a time of witness to our community. The service in the chapel at 10:30 was well attended and a large number of people followed the large Cross which was taken through Hugh Town to be placed on the summit of Buzza until Easter morning. At the foot of Buzza Hill Len Michell spoke about the hymn 'There is a Green hill Far Away', and on the summit Father Guy Scott said a prayer of blessing.

We returned to the Manse just before 12 noon where Pauline Jackson-Cocking and Veronica Deade served us all soup and shepherds' pie, with egg sandwiches provided by Claire Jenkins. This was a fine event with worship, witness, and fellowship coming together...This is our church at its best!

On Easter Sunday we had well attended services on St Martin's and St Mary's. Many visitors came to swell our numbers. This was a wonderful celebration of our free gift of Life Eternal which is given to all who will place their trust in the Risen Jesus.

It is, I believe, crucial that we continue to be 'Mission Minded' in the time ahead, there are many on these fine islands who are yet to hear the Good News of The Gospel. As a church we need the teaching, fellowship, and prayer to make our church strong in the days to come. During the month of May we have invited some 'key speakers and teachers' to help us in our mission. These good folk are coming to our islands at no cost to us, they are coming to inspire us, they are coming to teach us, and to be there to listen, and to attempt to answer our questions. If you would like one of these visiting ministers to come to your home it can be arranged, but please do be sure to come to listen to what they have to say.... What has been arranged will be a great blessing to us all.

At the start of May we have the Reverend Professor H Peter Stephens coming to our islands. This man is a scholar of great note, he is a past president of The Methodist Church and he will be speaking on the evenings of the 6<sup>th</sup> and 7<sup>th</sup> of May at the fellowship room on St Mary's. This is a unique opportunity to listen and to ask questions. Peter will be with us for a few days and will be leading worship on St Martin's and St Mary's on the 9<sup>th</sup> of May. Peter is a Cornishman, he visited the Isles of Scilly as a child, and he is looking forward to coming to share his vision of 'being church' with us all. We pray that his visit will be a great blessing to our church, and inspire us to be a church where all may again find hope in the Risen Jesus.

On Friday the 14<sup>th</sup> of May Rev Andrew Bell the Methodist Chaplain to Essex University will be speaking about his time of ministry in the Yorkshire Dales. He will be preaching and visiting on Sunday 16<sup>th</sup> of May on St Martin's, he will attend our Annual Church Meeting, and he will lead the evening worship at St Mary's that Sunday. He will be with us for a week, so if you would like him to visit you let me know.

At the end of the month we welcome The Rev H Barrie Morris to our islands. Barrie and his wife Elizabeth were for many years evangelists in Central Africa, he is a past member of the Methodist Conference, a Biblical teacher well worth listening to and a keen golfer! Come on Friday the 28<sup>th</sup> and Saturday 29<sup>th</sup> of May in the evenings to share fellowship, food and be inspired by this stoic and enthusiastic man of God. Barrie and his wife Elizabeth again will be here for a week and would love to receive invitations to visit your homes... make the most of this special visit.

I see a great future for the Methodist Church on these islands. Together we will witness to the great love of God to the people who live here, we will continue to welcome our visitors, and through prayer, Biblical teaching and good fellowship, we will each be equipped to carry out that great commandment 'To Love One Another!'

I remain, by the grace of God, and with the support of you all, the Methodist Minister for these fine Islands for a while. I give thanks to God daily for the faithfulness of His people, and for the vision He has given to us of being united in proclaiming the things of His Kingdom to this world in which we live.

May Father God keep watch between us, While we must spend this time apart, And may his gracious love sustain us, His healing hand upon our hearts.


In parting, though our hearts be broken, And tears, unbidden, fill our eyes Our Father hears our prayers unspoken And listens to our heartfelt cries.

If so, I was thinking of coming along." "That," said the clergyman, "I cannot promise. But we do expect that God will be there, and we fancy that that should be incentive enough for a reasonably large attendance."

#### Called to be you

Vocations Sunday, the fourth Sunday of Easter, is the Sunday set aside in the Church's calendar to encourage all of us think about our vocation.

So what is your vocation? You may think that you don't have a vocation or that vocations are the sort of thing clergy have. But if you think that, you're wrong. Each of us does have a vocation. God calls each one of us. The question, though, is to what?

First and foremost, God calls us to change: to become more Christ-like. We are called to live out our lives in response to the life, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. That process began in our baptism, but it continues through prayer, through the reading of the scriptures and through the receiving of Holy Communion. One of the constant themes in the New Testament is that lives touched by Christ were changed. What is true for the characters of the New Testament is true for us. As we encounter and respond to Christ we cannot help but be changed.

But while we are called to change, we are also called to be more deeply ourselves. God never calls us to be something or someone we're not. God always calls us to what we are capable of becoming. It may be that there are parts of us which are underdeveloped or which rarely see the light of day which need to be allowed to flourish so we can be our true selves.

It may be that we have hidden gifts which need to be discovered or it may be that there is something that we have secretly always wanted to do but have not had the courage or the time to try. Whatever it may be we need to find an outlet which will allow us to feel more excited about life or indeed to feel more alive.

St Irenaeus wrote that 'the glory of God is a human being fully alive'. Through the dual process of becoming more fully ourselves and of becoming more fully Christ-like, the will of God is fulfilled and the glory of God seen. That is what Vocations Sunday is about. You have one life. For God's sake and for your own, live it!

Plant four rows of squash: Squash gossip Squash indifference Squash grumbling Squash selfishness.




Plant four rows of lettuce: Lettuce be faithful Lettuce be kind Lettuce be happy Lettuce really love one another.




No garden should be without turnips: Turnip for service when needed Turnip to help one another Turnip the music and dance.
