Some thoughts from the Manse

When I last wrote for In Touch, John and I had just arrived and had been celebrating Harvest Festival on St. Mary's and St. Martin's. Well, on Wednesday of this week, I took my final harvest of the year at your school for Key Stages 1 and 2. Now the evenings are much darker; the clocks will soon go back and we are well and truly into autumn. The children are ready for their half-term break and when they return the next big event they look forward to is Christmas. Another year gone!

However, before that happens for those of us in the Church there are two festivals – that of 'All Souls' and that of 'Remembrance Sunday'; both at the beginning of November, and both reminding us of people who have gone before us who have had an often profound effect on our lives, and in the case of Armistice, on the life of the nation.

While 'All Souls' is now over shadowed by the very secular and Americanised events round 'Halloween', it is really an opportunity to remember and give thanks for the lives of those we love, but who are no longer with us. A chance to be still and acknowledge how much of what we are is due to the love and care of others and to recommit ourselves to love and care for those who are with us now.

For me and many thousands more it is a chance to thank God for those I have loved and still love and to place them all into His care and to remember that the distance between heaven and earth is very small and it is only, as a six year old once told me that "I don't have the right kind of eyes to see heaven" that makes it seem distant. But one day I shall see it and be in it.

Remembrance Day, as it says, is a day when we remember those killed and injured through warfare, particularly the world wars, but also in ongoing wars. People who have often acted with great courage and sacrificial love for their nation and its people.

It is this word "remember" which keeps going through my mind and also its opposite because to dismember means to tear apart, to cause pain and suffering and often death. To remember is to put together again, to heal and to restore. In the face of grief and loss we so often feel dismembered, torn apart and hopeless. Sometimes thinking back to other times is too much for us and we choose to try and forget.

However, to 'Re member' is a chance to rebuild, to choose to turn away from destruction and work for peace, for the sake of the whole world.

As a Christian minister, I often lead a service where we 'remember' the cruel, apparently senseless death of a young man who said every time you meet together, every time you eat and drink "Remember me, remember what I have done for you". In this remembering I believe He asks us to be ready to serve others, as He did. To love others as God does, and by doing that, to rebuild peoples' lives; to work for peace and harmony and by doing that to bring the reality of heaven closer to earth.

Each shoebox gift delivered by Operation Christmas Child is a tangible expression of God's amazing love. But a shoebox

gift is just the beginning. Many children who receive a shoebox will be invited by our church partners to learn more about Jesus through The Greatest Journey programme.

This programme consists of 12 fun-packed interactive lessons, taught by locally trained teachers in their communities, that the children can enjoy taking part in with their friends. Each lesson includes a Bible story and fun activities for the children to do together as a class – it might include a game, a drama, a song, artwork or some puzzles. Each week the children also learn a memory verse and see if they can remember it when they come back to the next lesson. These lessons might take place at after school clubs or at the weekend. Sometimes they might meet in a Church or in a school, or in some countries they might meet outside under a nice big tree. But wherever they meet they always have lots of fun learning more about lesus.

Gift Suggestions

Toys: Include items that children will immediately embrace such as dolls or stuffed toys (with CE label), toy trucks, harmonica, yo-yo, skipping rope, ball, small puzzles etc.

School Supplies: Pens, pencils & sharpeners, crayons or felt pens, stamps & ink pad sets, writing pads or notebooks & paper, solar calculators, colouring & picture books etc.

Hygiene Items: Toothbrush and toothpaste, bars of wrapped soap, comb or hairbrush, flannel.

Other Items: Hat, cap, gloves or scarf, sunglasses, hair accessories, jewellery set, wind up torch, wrapped sweets (best-before-date must be at least March of the following year).

Do not include: Used or damaged items, war related items such as toy guns, play soldiers or knives; chocolate or other food items; liquids or lotions of any type including bubbles; medicines; hand-made or knitted stuffed toys; anything of a political, racial or religious nature; sharp objects; glass containers, mirrors or fragile items; playing cards of the 4-suit variety; clothing other than as listed above.

Friendship lowers pain

Never underestimate the power of friendship – now it seems that friendships can even help keep pain at bay. A recent study has found that an active social life can actually lead to you having a higher tolerance for physical pain.

The study, which appeared in the journal Scientific Reports, investigated the effect of endorphins. As one medical expert explained: "Endorphins are part of our pain and pleasure circuitry. They're our bodies' natural painkillers, and also give us feelings of pleasure... One theory suggests that social interactions trigger positive emotions when endorphin binds to opioid centres in the brain. This gives us that 'feel good' factor that we get from seeing our friends

How joining a choir can keep cancer at bay

This sounds unlikely, but it seems that singing in a choir can help many cancer patients stay in remission.


The collaborative research carried out by Tenovus Cancer Care and the Royal College of Music has discovered that choral singing can help to increase levels of your immune proteins, reduce your stress and improve your mood – all factors which help prevent cancer from returning.

Dr Ian Lewis, director of Tenovus, explains: "We've long heard anecdotal evidence that singing in a choir makes people feel good, but this is the first time it's been demonstrated that the immune system can be affected by singing. It's really exciting and could enhance the way we support people with cancer in the future." The study was published in ecancermedicalscience.

The choral society is preparing for Christmas so if you want to keep healthy and join in the fun, why not go along on Monday nights 7:45 at the Manse?
