Foliage and flower preparation for arrangements. :

Many years ago I was given some instructions on how to prepare flowers for arrangements. I remember how valuable these instructions were and now I realise that a few tips may encourage any would be flower arrangers to join the flower rota

All flowers and foliage benefit from standing in water for a few hours before use.

Woody Stems

Woody stems need to be cut at an angle, and then split about a centimetre, remove any foliage which would; be under the water line and place in warm water, this treatment also works for semi-woody stems include

chrysanthemums, carnations and lilies. (Although by removing all foliage from the flower stems and using separate foliage the flowers will last longer)

Hollow Stems

Plants with hollow stems need a different preparation as if they are not treated air locks in the stem may happen when the stems are cut.

Cut stems at an angle; remove lower leaves before turning the stems upside down and filling with cool water. Plug:the stem with cotton wool then place in water.

A good basic tip for arranging the flowers is to imagine they all come from a central root.

You and many others will find joy from seeing. God's beautiful created flowers in a vase instead of in a garden.

CHURCHES'STEADFAST MESSAGE: GOD LOVES ALL, RACISM IS A 'SIN'

Disappointment and concern have been expressed by Churches following gains made by the British National Party (BNP) in the summer European Parliament Elections.

In the elections held on 4 June, the BNP won two seats in the European Parliament and three seats in local councils around the U.K.

Rachel Lampard, Public Issues Policy Advisor for the Methodist Church, said, "The limited success of the BNP does not change our steadfast message: God loves all. Racism is a sin. The campaigning

Work of the churches and other grass roots organisations has helped to highlight the need for people to vote positively, especially at a time when public confidence in politics has been shaken.

ACAT Action by Christians Against Torture

Several Christians on St Mary's belong to this organisation which campaigns against the use of torture against prisoners throughout the world. We sign letters of appeal to governments and send Christmas cards to prisoners throughout the world irregardless of their faith and pray for victims of torture and wrongful imprisonment, many being imprisoned because they have spoken against the abuse of power of governments.

"Earlier this year ACAT (UK) celebrated 25 years of campaigning and prayer. It was formed in 1984 because it was felt important that the churches and individual Christians should be involved in what was a battle for basic human rights, especially the right enshrined in the U.N Universal Declaration of Human Rights not to be tortured. In so many countries of the world, tyranny, torture, 'disappearance', and conflict were the order of the day. Over the years our members saw the Communist world collapse, the worst of the dictatorships disappear in Central

and South America, in Africa and the Far East, the fall of apartheid in South Africa. It seemed as that torture was about to become one of the horrors os the past to be placed in the dustbin of history. We hoped that ACAT would work itself out of a job.

Then came 9/11 which changed everything. The US president announced a war on terrorism. This gave the USA and a number of countries, including the UK carte blanche to bring in often draconian anti terrorism laws under the pretext of protecting its citizens. It seemed as if governments were forgetting that every act of torture is a crime under international law. So our work goes on.

Torture has not gone away, although the arguments in its favour are more sophisticated now. Archbishop Romero's words ring as true now as they did in 1980 for the Christians of El Salvador. We as falthful Christians, as the Church of Christ, have been calling to fight this battle. We will be given strength to continue campaigning and praying, knowing that through Christ we can achieve great things. Let us go forward in His Name"

Some thoughts from Down Under

As many of you know, Mike and I recently had a holiday in Australia. Our purpose for going every two years is to see our family in Brisbane and keep up with our grand-


daughters' progress. Each time we go we try to see a new part of Australia and this time it was the Red Centre and Alice Springs.

Alice is a small town seemingly in the middle of nowhere. It stands on the river Todd which, for most of the year, is completely dry. The town is laid out in a grid pattern with parks and tree-lined streets. At first glance it seems a very pleasant untroubled place but when you have been there for a little while you notice the Aboriginal people sitting around in groups in the parks or on the streets or just walking aimlessly along. They are a people whose traditional way of life has been destroyed by the early white settlers without anything to which they can relate being put in its place.

Recently attitudes have changed and the Australians are trying to make amends. Many tribal lands have been given back to the Aboriginal people and they are being encouraged to manage their own affairs in their traditional ways.

While in the area we took a trip to Uluru or Ayers Rock. This is a fantastic place rich in Aboriginal folk lore. The land around it has been given back to the Aborigines and they are managing it. They have an excellent visitor centre which explains their local legends and culture and gives them an autlet for their art and craft work. Visitors are expected to be sensitive to the sacred places in the area and to be respectful of them by not climbing the rock and by not walking on or photographing them. Our (white) guides were very emphatic that we should do nothing to offend the Aboriginal people.

It made me think about having respect for other peoples. The original white settlers in Australia had no respect for an ancient people with a well developed culture and so they created the 'displaced' people that we saw in Alice Springs. Whoever we meet in the world, however different their culture and ideals are from ours, should be given our respect. If we show that we value their way of life then they may come to value ours and many of the troubles in the world would be solved!



So What's Going On?

It is such a long time since the application form for altering the Chapel and the Hall went to the Buildings Dept. in Manchester and to our local Council that even I have difficulty remembering just what we are going to dol. The builders are on site and already the concrete has been removed at the side and front of the Chapel to provide wheelchair access, it has taken a great deal of effort to make this possible. There has been the usual problem with issues such as conserving the integrity of the site which has to be balanced with legislation regarding access for wheelchairs and others for whom steps are a problem, including mums and dads with pushchairs and prams.

Inside the Chapel some pews will be removed so that the occupiers of such 'vehicles' can sit within the main body of the chapel.

The Schoolroom/ hail/annex has long been in need of major repair. Damp penetrating from the wall adjoining Springfield Court has for too long been an eyesore. The wall against Back Lane is also in a poor state of repair, not just with penetrating damp but with a major crack as well (what does the Bible say about building on sand!) and the roof on the east side needs renewing with a scantile roof. This a traditional roof used on Scilly and other coastal locations. Along with these essential repairs the hall will have a new look and will be more welcoming for all its users. The builders are working enthusiastically and so I think we should be able to use the hall again in early December as planned.

This is work is being funded through a generous bequest from Joyce Pym's estate. Joyce, who welcomed many as a door steward was a faithful member of the congregation ,she died in 1993.
