

Some thoughts from St Mary's

The month of September looks like being a memorable month on the Isles of Scilly. Here on St. Mary's our new school will open, and we will see the results of all those years of planning and working together as this generation of Scillonian children mark what in so many ways is a new beginning. The teachers, the pupils, and all who are involved with education on these fine islands are

remembered in our prayers.

This new school is a wonderful provision for our islands and we are truly thankful, and this theme of 'being thankful' is a theme that is always there in our Sunday worship, and in our day to day lives as those who have received the good news of the Gospel.

Offering thanks to God for His provision is the response that flows from us when we find that having faith really does work, and that is why in every circumstance of life we are thankful to God, and trust Him to meet our deepest needs!

Thanksgiving is of course the main theme of our Harvest Thanksgivings this month. We do hope that friends from St. Mary's will come over to St. Martin's for our evening Harvest service on the 4th of this month, speak to me and I will arrange the boating. The Harvest Thanksgiving on St. Mary's is on the 18th,in the morning at 10.30 myself and Beryl Read will be leading the worship, and in the evening we will be holding a special Harvest Celebration Songs of Praise at 8pm. Harvest time is surely the sure reminder of the faithfulness of our Sovereign God to us all.

Sometimes, in the ups and downs of life, we can be far from thankful for that which surrounds us. I expect it must have been a little like this at the last meal that Jesus had with His disciples on the night of His arrest in the garden of Gethsemane.

The disciples are clearly bewildered by all that happened that evening as they met together in Jerusalem on the eve of the Passover celebrations.

The evening starts with Jesus taking a bowl of water and washing the disciples' feet. They were puzzled why He does this, for this was usually the job of a lowly servant. Then He tells them that one of those present is about to betray Him and that the following day another of them will dis-own Him, not once but three times! This was certainly not the evening that they were expecting, and then to make matters even worse Jesus announces that in a while He will be with them no longer.

Clearly by now those friends of Jesus were bewildered and anxious about the future, and I expect they did not in any way feel like 'Giving Thanks!' They just, like us at sometimes difficult times in our lives, did not know how things were going to turn out, they like us were no doubt hanging on to their faith by their fingertips, but as we learn later the faith they did have was rewarded!

That evening Jesus sees their anxiety about the days ahead and offers them words of comfort, and He tells them that in this time of difficulty that they will find help, and that is something that many of us have found to be very true in those difficult times in life.

The part of the story that always challenges me, every time that I read it, is how Jesus having washed the feet of His disciples like a lowly servant then tells them to go and do likewise, and if you do this then you will be greatly blessed! It is as if He is saying to them if you really want to be blessed, be like me and do as I have done for you!

Maybe the only way we can really show our thankfulness to God is to follow the way of Jesus. To have His attitude to others, to treat others better than they deserve, and to go on loving even in the face of anxiety and in the face of difficulty.

About a year before Jesus had said to His disciples," If any of you want to be like me you must deny yourselves, and you must take up your cross and follow " The events that followed that last evening meal together, must I expect, have reminded His friends of what He said earlier. The very next day Jesus died upon a cross just outside the city walls of Jerusalem, and being thankful must now have been a very difficult thing for those followers who I expect thought all was lost.

In the ups and downs of life we, the followers of Jesus, are always called to give thanks. Even in the difficult times we are called to serve and to make sacrifices for others. This will never be easy, but as some of us know, God does always keep His promises, and just as Jesus promised his disciples on that last evening together that they would not be alone, He says the same to us today.

The very hallmark of the Christian life is to offer thanks to God, even in the great difficulties of life, and this is only possible if we really trust in God. We do indeed have a sure and certain hope, for Jesus, who gave His life for us, has been raised from the dead.

Harvest time is a great time to give thanks to God. Let us celebrate His great faithfulness, let us show our trust in His provision, and let us show our faith in giving generously to others.

Soon the summer months will be over, the visitors will have returned home, and we will be here on these sometimes remote islands to be a sign of God's grace in this place. May we always be seen as people who are truly thankful to God, may we set out to serve this island community with the many gifts that we have, and may we feel close to God as we live that sacrificial life, which is the way of Jesus, and will always be the way of those who follow Him.

I remain, by the grace of God, your minister on these islands for a while. May His rich blessings continue to be seen in our love for one another. *Charlie Gibbs*

It is with sadness that we have seen the passing of Celia, a dear and devout wife, mother, and member of our small congregation for some 60 years.

Rev. Charlie Gibbs conducted Celia's funeral on August 5th when Rodney, Alison, Margaret, and her partner David were supported by Heather, Alan, Christine and Christopher.

Heather and Christine's Dad was a cousin of Uncle Rodney's and they all grew up together at Middletown. I know that Rodney and the girls have been grateful for all the help they have given these past difficult months.

Other family members were able to attend from St. Austell and St. Mary's along with some 15 folk from St. Mary's Chapel.

The 12 island bearers were led by Derek Perkins (Rodney was his best man). When the whole island comes together at such times it reminds us of how self sufficient we need to be in a small community.

The island's mourners in the Chapel overflowed into the Sunday school room and demonstrated how loved and respected Celia was. Rev. Charlie paid tribute to her long life of service and care. A teacher, Celia met Rodney whilst on holiday in the islands and after they were married settled at Middletown to help run the family flower farm.

Celia was a lady of many talents; she had a keen intellect, a wonderful singing voice and she loved her reading and sailing. Over the years she has run our Sunday School and filled in when needed at the Primary School. Latterly Celia and and Rodney have hosted our regular Bible study evenings.

Rev Tony Pudner a long time friend, from his days in his first ministry in the islands, also shared his and Wendy's fond memories of Celia, including the hospitality provided when staying on St. Martin's to preach.

Beach Labyrinth is a new take on an ancient tradition. How far have you come to this point in your life to be here right here, now? Walking the Beach Labyrinth gives an opportunity to think about the journey of life. A chance to

let go of any rubbish in your life; a chance to draw a line in

the sand and move on, a chance to make a solid change for the better.

Hundreds of people of all ages, and all backgrounds have walked this in the last couple of years, many speaking of how helpful they found it – and giving some a great sense of relief, purpose (and most importantly fun!)

Over a hundred people walked the Labyrinth on St Mary's and at the Sunday morning service following Andrew told us a very moving story of one visitor who remembered the horrific killing of fellow Christians in Iran. She like others collected a piece of rubbish and laid it at the foot of the cross, symbolising the horrific persecution of her friends, and leaving it in the Lord's hands.

The Lord says this" Stand at the cross roads and ask for the ancient paths. Which way was the good way? Take it and you will find rest for yourselves" Jeremiah 6.16

Songs of Praise

This service has been welcomed by our visitors and as I write this we are preparing to sing on the Quay. On 14th August we had a more traditional Songs of Praise when members, mostly of the Seagull Cottage Wednesday Fellowship group chose the hymns and said why they had made that particular choice. Val Parker was away at a family wedding so she sent the following for Mary to read.

If anyone at the end of my life would say I had done a fraction of the list in the hymn, I would feel I had done well!"

We have also welcomed Rev Steven Wild to our evening service on 7th August. An inspiration to all of us, he reminded us of God's forgiveness through the passage of Jesus and the woman who committed adultery.

Isles of Scilly Methodist's outreach

This contribution to 'In Touch' will focus on three activities supported by members of the Methodist Church here in the Isles.

For me, Gwen Clarkson, this magazine has always been a valuable part of our contact with members of the community here and with many friends across the sea who love the Islands and us. Until recently we have regarded the magazine as a way of keeping you all informed about our doings. We have not felt the need to ask for any financial contribution, especially from those who receive their copies by post. Sadly now, the costs of production and the postage have risen so much that we were forced to ask for help. Several friends have realised that they can read the text on the Internet so fewer copies are needed each month. Furthermore, we have been given generous donations towards our costs, both in cash and by gifts of 2nd class stamps. We are grateful for this assistance. In addition one or two members of our congregation have agreed to send the magazine to family and friends who have appreciated having it every month.

We have supported the Methodist Church Charity Action for Children, (formerly the National Childrens' Home). Thanks to recent fund-raising and especially with the contents of member's Home Collecting Boxes, we have been able to send another £32.

At the end of June I was able to send a parcel to Wales for the Charity U.C.D.F (Uganda Child Development Fund).

The dispatch was of another collection of Teddies, made by our knitters here in the chapel. Each one is in a colourful bag, made by dear Mary Barnes, though she is not a member of our congregation. The combination of bear and bag is unique, with the facial expressions and the different colours of the clothing. Do ask to see a sample if you are interested in helping with this activity. Knitting instructions, wools and stuffing for the teddies is all available.

The contigent of Teddies recently sent will be transported to Uganda, carried in the bags of friends of the charity going there. Again , many thanks to to you all who support this lovely work.

We may be a small community here in the islands, except for the height of Summer, but in the Methodist Church we have a lot to show for our Christian commitment to the outside world!

New Five Islands School

We welcome the news that the School is complete and will provide many resources for the whole community and we pray that all who use it will be blessed. We regularly pray for Bryce, his staff and the children. At this time we understand that they will all be under extra pressure during the new term and we pray that they will soon be fully able to enjoy the new building and its facilities.
