Mary and I have now come to the end of our first year here on Scilly. Now we at least know what to expect in the coming years, and we both are beginning to feel at home in this place which in some ways is so different to where we have served before.

The church on these islands has so many opportunities and so many challenges. It is certainly a joy to welcome so many visitors over the summer months, and many have said how much they have valued being with us in worship on a Sunday.

A lot of visitors come year after year. Gwen sends this magazine to a long list of friends on the mainland, and Chris Savill tells me that lots of people visit our church website from all over the world. Our ministry is to these visitors but it is also to those who live and work on these islands when our visitors have gone home.

I now know what to expect in the winter months ahead, and it is certainly very different to the summer. It is maybe in the winter that we see the real state of our church. Our numbers are quite small, which is a reflection of the small number of people who are resident here over the winter months. It is during this time that our focus is on caring for one another and being there to help and support to this island community. And it is then that we are called to be a sign of God's Kingdom in this place.

As I am beginning to understand more about Scilly and the people who live here I can see that the church still has an important part to play in this community. So many of the situations and the circumstances which I have witnessed during my first year here seem to be 'crying out' to be touched and healed by the unchanging message of God's grace.

Matthew in his Gospel records for us the words that are often referred to as Jesus's 'Sermon On The Mount'. Here we have laid before us what I often think of as a 'glimpse into the kingdom of heaven' What Jesus says is a great challenge as to just what our priorities are in life, he speaks of a community where outcasts are welcome, where security is found, not in wealth, but instead in acts of human kindness, and of a way of living that offers hope, even to in the darkest moments of our lives. His words are a challenge to us all, but they are certainly a great challenge to many of the situations here on Scilly.

In this sermon, Jesus tells us about the wise and foolish builders. The foolish builder built a fine house on sand, but it did not withstand the winter storms. The wise builder built his house on solid rock, and it stood firm, even when things got rough!

O how I long to see this island community being rebuilt on that solid rock of Jesus! O how I long to see God's love and God's grace and forgiveness touching the hearts of those who live on these beautiful islands, and O how I long for his healing to be witnessed among the ordinary people of this place.

Those of us who know the truth and the power of these things I pray will be strengthened by God's Holy Spirit! I pray that we will be tireless in our love of one another, and that even when those winter storms come, and the sea of life is raging, that we will be resolute in sharing our message of hope with others!

Enjoy the remaining days of summer! Pray for one another, and care for one another. Be there for one another in the storms of life....... and continue to trust in The Lord Jesus, that you may be safe and secure in His blessings.

I remain by the grace of God, the Methodist minister on these fine islands.

Naval Chaplain

I was pleased to see that the August edition contained reference to the celebration of the 150 years of participation in chaplaincy to the armed forces by Methodist Ministers. A small booklet was published to mark this and when I opened mine I was a bit taken aback to see a picture of me, robed and emerging from the body of a submarine. I have to say I haven't my own copy of this picture and can't remember when it was taken, save that my beard was yet to appear and it must therefore date back to about 1972-3. The submarine was obviously alongside in the base at HMS DOLPHIN in Gosport which was part of my appointment at the time. Little did I know that twenty-five years of my ministry would be spent as a Methodist Minister serving in the Church of Scotland and Free Churches branch of Naval Chaplaincy. Once I thought a rough voyage on the old Scillonian was a long trip but that was somewhat dwarfed by voyages from Gibraltar to the Falklands in the Ice Patrol Ship HMS ENDURANCE, and from the Arabian Gulf to Fremantle in Australia in HMS TIGER. Royal Naval Chaplains hold the Queen's Commission but unlike chaplains of the other two arms they wear no badges of rank and the usual phrase to describe them is that they are there to be "the friends and advisors of all on board ship" and shore bases and establishments are still referred to as ships.

Don't forget starving Christians in Niger

Barnabas Fund is urging Christians not to forget their starving brothers and sisters in stricken Niger following mainstream news reports about the escalating food crisis.

The renewed call follows aid appeals from Oxfam, which described the situation as "extremely desperate", and Save the Children, which warned that up to 380,000 children under five are at risk of death by starvation.

Barnabas Fund is already helping the Christian community, having provided 681 families with maize or millet and rice – funded by donations totalling $\pounds 40,000$ – but more aid is urgently needed. Visit: www.barnabasfund.org/Dont-forget-starving-Christians-in-Niger

MRDF seeks support for Pakistan flood victims

WITH more than 1,500 people dead after heavy flooding in north-west Pakistan, the Methodist Relief and Development Fund (MRDF) is accepting donations to support relief efforts in the affected areas.

The United Nations estimates that more than 3 million people have been affected by the flooding. There are fears that the number of casualties and homeless will rise as rescuers gain access to hard-to-reach areas where roads were destroyed. Initial aerial pictures show that whole villages have been washed away.

There are also concerns that diseases such as cholera and diarrhoea will spread as there is a limited supply of clean water.

Glastonbury- Facts you may not have known

Probably most of our readers know little of the Glastonbury Festival held in each year on the farm of Michael Eaves.

It is still a working farm for the rest of the year, and in fact the work of caring for the livestock continues throughout the time of the festival. Michael now arranges this with his daughter Emily and it grows year on year with other arts besides music – it is really called A Festival of Contempory Performing Arts.

The festival has always donated large sums to charities throughout the world, this year the beneficiaries were Oxfam, Greenpeace and Water Aid as well as local charities. In the past it has funded schools and wells in Africa, farm projects in Vietnam and social housing in nearby Pilton. Last year it gave away £2 million.

Michael Eavis says "There used to be a lion on Golden Syrup tins, I don't know if it is still on it, but it had a motto 'Out of the strong came forth sweetness' and I felt the same about the festival...... "He goes on to say" It must be a Methodist thing. I felt deep down that we were doing something right".
